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

THIRTEEN National Camp Meetings Appointed for 1870!

HAMILTON near Boston Mass., JUNE 29th.
OAKINGTON near Havre de Grace, Md., July 12
DES PLAINES, near Chicago, Ill., August 9th.

Nothing we suppose, appearing in our paper this week, will command so much attention and occasion such a wide-spread interest as the announcement we place above. How it came about, we take the liberty to inform our readers.

The National Camp Meeting Committee, by arrangement, met at the M. E. Tabernacle in the city on Wednesday 29th Inst. at 10 A. M. to determine upon the site of their meeting next year. The President of the Committee, and his colleagues, which consisted of the leading the 35th chapter of Isaac, offered a prayer for divine guidance in the choice and responsible selection of a site.

The friends, now, of the Tabernacle's Secretary, Rev. Mr. Clemon, have made an arrangement to have the Tabernacle open and sweeped out for the use of the association.

The Tabernacle is now closed.

On the 29th Inst. the Tabernacle was open.

Committees were present from several of the principal towns and cities, and members of their respective societies and classes, from every county in the country, and from the neighboring states, and from the city, with Rev. Mr. France, P. Elder, Dr. Mr. Snyder, S. J. Somers and John Wight, Prof. of Havre de Grace, to support the nomination from Maryland.

After full and patient deliberation, each case, the Committee, with unanimous prepared to make their decision.

The call from New England was intensely urgent. Rev. Mr. McDonald of Boston, and Rev. Mr. Manger of Maine, recommended the need of a National Camp Meeting in that section with eloquent appeals.

Full as earnest was the Macedonian cry from the West; and with such an array of influence and numbers in Maryland, the Committee found themselves unable to decide on any one place, in exclusion of all the others.

At this juncture, Rev. Mr. Inskip, of Baltimore, and Father Coleman, of New York, Light suddenly came, and were soon found in the unanimous impulse to *make a meeting at each place* arranged as to time, as far as possible, with the other camp-meetings of the local meetings in their respective sections of country where they were situated.

The committee had been consulting, &c. At length, however, a unanimous decision was made to have three meetings in New England.

Such was the result of the discussion of such pleadings, &c., and evidently opening a great and effectual door for this movement, we hope the result will indicate His hand in the matter.

The entire Committee stand pledged to attend each meeting, if life and health is spared them, and this fact gives assurance that, with the extraordinary power of the Holy Ghost, each will prove a Pentecost.

So unanimous had the decision been, that the doxology was lustily sung, and when the question of time had been satisfactorily adjusted, the President offered prayer that the holy flame might be kindled in New England, sweep over the intervening States, burn with increasing ardor on the border ground, and spread on and onward over the mighty West, until the whole continent would be wrapped in a blaze of glory!

The outsiders were then admitted and informed of the result of the Committee's deliberations. We could not help sympathizing with our friend Mr. Hillman, of Round Lake memory, who was disappointed, as was the delegates from Newburg, West Branch, and other points. All, however, acquiesced in the decision, and the meeting closed in great harmony.

On the Hamilton Grounds, near Boston, where the first meeting will be held, and the Des Plaines Grove, near Chicago, we will give some account in due time; but at present we have only space to give our readers, who are mostly interested in the central meeting a brief description of the new site called "Oakington" on the P. W. & B. Rail Road.

"Oakington."

This name, which hereafter will prove as widely and favorably known as Vineland, Monheim or Round Lake, at present represents a small station on the Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Railroad, 24 miles south of Havre de Grace, Md., 65 miles from Philadelphia, and 33 from Baltimore.

A VISIT TO THE GROUNDS.

On Thursday of last week, in company with Rev. Thompson, Gray, S. W. Thomas, and Cookman, we visited Oakington, meeting Rev. Mr. Inskip and the brethren from Havre de Grace there. Arriving the station we found it well wooded, that of about 80 acres, at any one of several positions in which, a congregation might be pitched capable of accommodating a thousand tents with excellent shade for the largest outdoor congregation.

THE SPRING OF WATER.

Abundant to be both excellent and abundant. A running stream which affords the motive power to a mill in the vicinity, runs along the southern extremity of the grounds, and a living spring to which our attention was specially directed, pours out a ceaseless stream of pure and sweet water. The scenery in this vicinity is diversified and quite romantic, a deep dell and precipitous hills mark the course of the running brook, and affords ample drainage in the event of heavy rains. The spring

water can be forced up on the camp ground, and through suitable reservoirs will be made accessible to the multitude.

THE "CIRCLE".

May be formed at a distance of only 300 yards from the Depot, or if it should be desirable to avoid the noise of passing trains, and moving crowds, it may be located at a greater distance.

Mr. Wright of Havre de Grace, who visited Round Lake last July, and took a general observation of the place and manner of its there, will aid in laying out the grounds, and Mr. Inskip will give personal supervision to all the preliminary arrangements.

THE RAIL ROAD COMPANY.

Will be, although known to be independent, has claimed a right to be regarded as a stockholder and will in this instance do the arrangements for the transportation of passengers to and from the camp. This road and Mr. Inskip stated in the crowded meeting at the Tabernacle on Wednesday evening, that the best in the country, especially regular in its running time, and safe and in its general management. Our friends consult this paper for all needed information on the time approached, therefore, particularly to those experienced in business and shipping, although it will be the largest congress ever held in Maryland, or perhaps on this continent, will afford accommodations of the best kind, and at the lowest possible rates, for all who may wish to attend all the Lord's.

We might suggest to the Superintendent the propriety of erecting a legible sign board at the station on which in the meantime passing travelers from all parts of the land may read the name "OAKINGTON."

Both the other meetings will be held on grounds already prepared and previously used for such purposes.

Mr. Inskip, President of the Committee. He gave a brief and interesting sketch of the first and subsequent national Camp-meetings, and the arduous and responsible task which the Committee had assembled, that day to the meeting the numerous and pressing applications from different sections of the country, for the meeting next year, and the necessity which seemed to exist for holding three.

He concluded with a brief address, and the blessing of the blessing, and then laid his hands upon their feet.

ginal status, as a first-class Seminary.

Throughout Pennsylvania and Maryland there are

many who will rejoice to hear of the prosperity

of Williamsport Dickinson Seminary.

In Philadelphia we have many who owe their disci-

pine and education originally to this honored

institution. It has just finished twenty years

of struggle and toil. May the next score be

years of consecrated labor, and yield an abun-

dant harvest.

Bro. J. L. Inskip Pres of National Camp meeting met with the camp meeting association this day in the woods at Oakington and selected the site for the camp of 1870.

The association this day have adopted the following rules for their government

The Officers of this association shall be a President, Treasurer & Secretary

That no act or agreement shall be deemed valid unless adopted, by the unanimous vote of this association.

For the expeditious discharge of duty there shall be committees on the following said committee being one of this association

1st Rail Roads & Steamboats

2nd On the preparation of the ground

3rd On Lumber & erection of Buildings

4th On Water & Light

5th On Tents

6th On Privileges

7th On Store & Provisional

8th On Roads

9th On Furniture & bedding

10th On Printing

11th On Accounts

12th Police arrangements

13th Baggage delivery

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4th The duties of the Committee on R R + Steam Boats shall be to make arrangements for the expeditions transportation of passengers to and from the camp and at as low rates and with as much benefit to the association as possible

5th

The duties of the Committee on preparation of the ground suitable for seating and tenting, erecting the stand and seats and tents, and renting the ground for private tents

6th

The duties of the Committee on Lumber and erection of Buildings shall be to procure lumber and deliver it on the ground, to erect store Book and committee rooms and all necessary out buildings

7th

The duties of the Committee on Water and Light shall be to make provision for an ample supply of Water for the use of the camp and for sufficient lighting of the ground

8th

The duties of the Committee on "tents" is to procure all tents and rent the same and at the close of the camp to return them to their respective owners,

9th

The duties of the Committee on privileges shall be to rent all privileges incident to Camp Meetings such as Boarding tents, Horse pond, Barber's tent Book Store &c &c.

10th

The duties of the Committee on store shall be the purchasing of supplies for the store, for the supply of Ice Milk, Bread, Meats or whatever may be required at the store or any of its departments.

11th

The duties of the Committee on Roads shall be to ^{make &} keep the road & avenue in good repair and to have charge of the gate or gates.

12th

The duties of the Committee on Furniture & Bedding shall be to procure all furniture, bedding straw &c and rent the same and at the close of the Camp to return it to their owners.

13th

The duties of the Committee on printing shall be to contract for all printing necessary to be done.

14th

The duties of the Committee on accounts shall be the inspection of all bills the supervision of the daily accounts that may be rendered and perform such other duties as may be required of him.

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 " 15th The duties of Committee on police shall be to provide an efficient police force and make such provision for their distribution with the chief Manager as to secure the peace of the encampment

16th The duties of Committee on Baggage delivery shall be to provide transportation for the prompt delivery of Baggage to and from the Camp.



For Horse feeding privilege \$25
In furnishing meat to the encampment 17cts
per lb.

of sales


