To the bill for Reviveing the Temporary Lawes: His Lop sayes that in that bill there is mentioned an Act for killing of to bee revived, by the same, weh Ought not to have been there because by an Act of Assembly for Ascertayning the Lawes of this province the sayd Act is made perpetuall and soe has noe need of being revived: To weh Mr Speaker made Answere That though the Act was by a mistake put into the Act for Ascertayning the Lawes, weh law for Ascertayneing the Lawes is a perpetuall Law, Yet he humbly Conceives that the Act for killing of wolves, being in its Owne body, Expressed to be Temporary is not made perpetuall by being barely Incerted into the Other, for though that Law be perpetuall weh Ascertaynes the lawes therein mentioned to be
