## May the 15th 1705

May it please your Excellency,

I humbly crave Leave to mind your Excy of a Letter writ by the Lords Commissioners of Trade & Plantations to this Governm' relating to the wrongs done to the Lord Proprietor in and by a Law Entituled an Act for ascertaining the Bounds of Land and that no Answer has been given thereunto as yet to the great Delay of doing his Ldship Justice in Matters so apparently injurious to his Ldships Property I thought this the most proper Time (the Assembly sitting) to give your Excy this Intimation that by the next Return of Ships for England I may be capable of informing his Lordship what shall be done
