Honours that Deborah the Relict and Executrix of the said Charles Ridgeley hath made up her Account of the Adm'n of her said Husband's Estate and balanced the same to a very small Trifle less than forty shillings so that she alledgeth she hath not wherewith to satisfy your Petitioner unless the real Estate of her said Husband or at least so much thereof be sold to Answer your Petitioner's just Demands. Therefore your Petitioner humbly prays Leave that a Bill may be brought in to that End, and he shall ever pray.
