personal trouble in that transaction ; the allow-
ing a gross sum for the trouble in finishing the
crop, would be contrary to the act of assembly,
which expressly says, that the commissary-ge-
neral “ shall allow him his reasonable charges
expended in finishing the crop ;” the allowance
of ten per cent. commission on the payments
made, generally concludes the account ; the
whole amount whereof must be brought into
one denomination, viz. into *current money*, in
the manner above mentioned ; the whole credit
of the account will then appear, which is to be
deducted out of the amount of the inventory,
and lists of debts above debited ; the balance
thereof (if any) is so much *current money*, still
in the executor or administrator’s hands, to be
accounted for in an additional account, the
which when passed must be filed an *additional
account* ; if another is added to this, then it is
the second, third, or fourth additional account,
carrying the balance and the date of the pre-
ceding account regularly forward in the suc-
ceeding ones, until the whole estate is accounted
for, that is, until the executor or administrator
declares that he hath no more accounts to pass ;
then this last account is termed a *final account*,
and as such endorsed ; if not a final one, then
the endorsement runs thus, *time prayed to pass
another account*, and two months time may be
allowed,
