January 20, 1870.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates:

We have received your message inviting us into the Chamber of your House, for the purpose of proceeding to the election of three Commissioners of Police for the City of Baltimore, and concur therein.

We have nominated on the part of the Senate, Messrs. Lefevre Jarrett, W. H. B. Fusselbaugh, Jas. E. Carr and Wm. H. Neilson.

Which was read.

The Senators of Maryland, accompanied by their Secretary, now appeared in the Hall of the House of Delegates.

The Speaker then announced that the Senate and House would now, in Joint Convention, proceed to the election of three Police Commissioners for the City of Baltimore, as agreed upon between the two Houses, and in accordance with the provisions of the Act of Assembly, January session, 1867.

The Speaker appointed Mr. Snyder on the part of the Senate, and Mr. Blake on the part of the House, to act as tellers.

The Secretary of the Senate, and Clerk of the House of Delegates, proceeded to call the roll of their respective Houses.

Whereupon each member proceeded to ballot.

Upon counting the ballots,
