on meat and on grain, and we still have in our declara-1 tion the purposes, not in that same language, but somehow 2 the feeling of the same language and, of course, out of 3 the Grange there came the granger laws and there has been an essay in almost all the law schools in the United 5 States that is just currently in process; having law students write essays on the Grange laws, particularly 7 the Interstate Commerce Commission, which grew out of 8 this effort and the Sherman Anti-Trust Law. 9 Certainly, we have some feeling, some belief 10 We know there are monopolies of different kinds 11 One is probably a necessity in economic life, but cer-12 tainly this is a necessity and affirmation, I believe, 13

So, I believe this would point out most of the things I would wish to comment on and, I'm sorry I didn't have time to write this up, but if you want it, I will try to find time to write it up and give it to you.
