

1 are federally unconstitutional and have a practical
2 problem, but in writing a constitution for 1967, I
3 wonder, and I am not altogether certain in my own mind,
4 how long it is going to be before it is an anachronism
5 to find it necessary to put these kind of phrases in
6 constitutions. I am afraid it is a long time and because
7 of it, I think perhaps this Commission ought to give
8 some recognition, perhaps not in the words of the Con-
9 necticut Constitution, or the ones Dr. Jenkins submitted
10 earlier to the Commission, but I wonder whether the
11 Commission shouldn't give in the Constitution in the
12 Declaration of Rights a certain place for it, some recog-
13 nition of the fact that our Constitution will not tolerate
14 discrimination, at least as enforced by the State.

15 DR. JENKINS: Mr. Chairman, as to that, I
16 regret that I can't follow Mr. Case's principle and find
17 rolling phrases covering this in the 1867 Constitution.

18 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Bond?

19 MR. BOND: I would like to echo to a degree
20 what Mrs. Bothe said. I think when you talk about the
21 word segregation in the Connecticut Constitution, I
