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appear for the State. The case went to the Court of Appeals, and the Court of Appeals in an elaborate opinion held that the discovery rules were not applicable in criminal cases, as they were in civil cases.

That is one illustration, but that would be a very broad use of discovery. That is the kind of thing that we are talking about.

MRS. BOTHE: Does the Committee or anyone know whether any State constitution, and I am not speaking now of laws and rules of court, allows for discovery in criminal cases?

PROFESSOR ASPER: I have no idea.

THE CHAIRMAN: Judge Shook wrote a rather lengthy opinion in which she reviewed a great many decisions in other States, and my recollection is that there is a considerable body of professorial comment, may I say, law reviews, and whatnot advocating this, but I think it hasn't been translated into actual rules or statutes except perhaps in very few instances.

MRS. BOTHE: I was just thinking perhaps it was taking much too big a bite to ask the Committee at
