Mr. Brooks, whether we have the authority at this point to change some of the decisions made earlier in respect to total membership. I remember on one or two occasions, we talked about the passage of a bill by majority of those present, and this body as a whole said that they wanted it to be --

THE CHAIRMAN: No, I am not talking about that.

I am talking about only instances where an extraordinary number is required.

DR. BARD: I see.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any further discussion?

Mr. Sykes?

MR. SYKES: Mr. Chairman, it seems to me that there is a different strength to the policy behind the requirement of a higher number in each of a great many different instances. I would think the first question to be put is whether there should be any uniformity at all, and I am frank to say that I think there should not be.

Now, if there is not to be uniformity, then I would question whether we should try to solve this problem on the basis of abstract arithmetic. I think the amount,
