the proportion that would be required in each case would be better discussed in the context of the individual Committee reports where you can assess the strength of the policy involved in the light of all the flesh and bones of each individual question.

I suggest that to the Chair as a method of proceeding and maybe a suggestion of what votes to take. I am not ready to vote on each individual item without checking what the present constitutional provision is, by seeing whether there is any overriding need for change; and if there is no need for uniformity, then a great deal of the argument for change would, it seems to me, to lose its authority.

THE CHAIRMAN: Well, if we had unlimited time, I think it would be desirable to do as you suggest. The difficulty is that if we are going to have a draft for the next meeting, the Committees which have not yet submitted reports on the specific points here might not have any guide or direction. I am not suggesting that we try to cover every point that may be in the present Constitution in which an extraordinary vote is required, but

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
