2 Mr. Scanlan's basic premise is false, as we
3 found from an investigation of the actual operations
4 of the higher educational institutions. We feel the
5 University is unique. If we didn't, we would not have
6 proposed that it be made an exception to the other, not
7 only the other higher educational institutions, but the
8 other institutions in the State generally. The amend-
9 ment as he puts it would considerably weaken, of course,
10 not only as applied to the other higher educational
11 institutions of the State, but the whole principle that
12 we sought to make in the Constitution would be greatly
13 watered down.

14 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Case?

15 MR. CASE: Well, Mr. Chairman, I think enough
16 has been said about this probably, very frankly, and it
17 tends to get somewhat emotional which it shouldn't be
18 in a group of this kind. I agree with Mrs. Bothe. As
19 I understood the vote on the Scanlan motion, number one,
20 it was a vote in favor of the type of physical autonomy
21 that is embraced in that particular provision for the
