Dear Sir,—In answer to your note of this morning, requesting me to answer the following interrogatories addressed to you by the chairman of the committee on printing, to wit:

1. To whom, if to any one, were the copies sent?

2. At what time were the copies distributed?

3. Were you paid for the printing of them?

In answer to the first I will say, that I assisted in the packing of them, with the Journal and Laws, sending five to each member of the Legislature, and that I was employed by his Excellency the Governor to distribute them, (that is, the laws, journals, documents, and so on,) to the clerks of the several county courts. I will also state, that 500 copies were printed for the State, and that 250 were printed for a private gentleman, who failed to receive them, and that a part of that number remain in your office at present.

To the second I will state, that having received the contract for distributing, as above stated, I left this city about the 1st of July, the day that I received the contract, and returned, after having distributed them, on the 4th July.

To the third I can make no answer, as I have no knowledge of the fact.
