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SATURDAY, Feb. 1, 1840.

Mr. Seidenstricker presented the memorial of the mayor and city council of Baltimore, praying for a modification of an act of Assembly passed December session 1838, relating to the Baltimore and Susquehanna Rail Road;

Read and referred to the committee on internal improvements and ordered to be printed.

Mr. Foard presented eight several petitions of sundry citizens
