

Also, the bill, entitled an act to provide for the more equal distribution among the different academies in Worcester county, of the State's donation for the benefit of academies in said county;

Also, the bill, entitled an act to divorce Mary Ann R. Fisher, of Dorchester county, from her husband, Levin T. Fisher;

Also, the bill, entitled an act to alter the division line between the 3d and 7th election district in Carroll county;

Also, the bill, entitled an act for the benefit of school district No. 11, in Frederick county;

And, the bill, entitled an act to protect property in Kent and Queen Anne's counties, lying upon Chester river;

Severally endorsed, "will pass" and the bills severally ordered to be engrossed;

Also, the bill, entitled a further supplement to the act enlarging the powers of the High Court of Chancery;

Endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments,"

Which amendments were severally read the first and by a special order the second time, severally assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

Also, the resolution in relation to certain wharves in the city of Baltimore,

And the resolution requesting the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Delegates, to transmit copies of the report and resolutions relative to the public lands, to our Senators and Representatives in Congress and the Governors of the several States:

Severally endorsed, "assented to," and the resolutions ordered to be engrossed.

Also, the resolution relative to the Maryland Hospital;

Endorsed "dissented from."

Also, the bill, entitled an act for the relief of Grove Shipley and Reuben Connaway, of Carroll county;

And, the bill, entitled an act to diminish the expenses of government;

Severally endorsed, "will not pass;"

And delivered the following messages:

*By the Senate,*

April 2, 1841.

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates:*

Not having the power to amend the bill passed by your honorable body entitled "an act to diminish the expenses of government," and dissenting from some of its provisions, the senate have been obliged to reject the bill although many of its provisions are acceptable to the senate. If your honorable body will amend the provisions of the first section so as to reduce the salary of the Governor to four thousand dollars, and abolish the offices of Armorer for the Western and Eastern Shore, the Judge of the Land Office of the Eastern Shore, and the office of Eastern Shore Treasurer, and place the armories under the direction of the Adjutant General, and reduce the per diem
