Sa the enacting clause of the bill was stricken out.

On motion of Mr. Bowie,

The House took up for consideration the preamble and resolutions submitted by him in relation to the State's claim against the United States for monies advanced by the State, for the use and benefit of the United States during the late war with Great Britain;

The said resolutions were then read the second time, assented to and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Johnson, chairman of the committee on Ways and Means, reported a bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act to tax the commissions of certain officers of this State;

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Worthington, of Anne Arundel, reported a bill entitled, an act to authorize Stephen Beard, Sen., of Anne Arundel county, to deed certain property therein named;

Which was read the first and by a special order the second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

A communication was received from his Excellency Governor Pratt, by the hands of Wm. T. Wootton, Esq., Secretary of State, enclosing certain accounts of the editors of the Frederick Examiner and Republican Citizen, for publishing the rules of Frederick county court, as required under the act of 1837 and the supplemental act of 1839:

Which was read, and with the accounts therein mentioned, referred to the committee on Claims.

Mr. Johnson, of Anne Arundel, chairman of the committee on Ways and Means, to which was referred the bill reported by Mr. Long, entitled, an act for the relief of Thomas Robertson, Sen., of Somerset county, reported favorably thereon, and submitted the following resolution:

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Treasurer of this State pay to Thomas Robertson, Sen., of Somerset county, or to his order, the sum of three hundred and eighty-two dollars and eighty cents, in full of his claim against the State for damages to his lands, caused by the construction through them of the Eastern Shore Rail Road. The said sum being the equivalent for five hundred and eighty dollars, the amount allowed him by the board of commissioners, and inadvertently omitted in their award, converted into money at the present market value of the
