REPORT:

That there were eighty-seven votes cast in all, and that for the Farmers' Bank of Maryland, at Annapolis, Robert Ghiselin received seventy votes; Alexander Kilgour received sixty-nine votes, and Thomas J. Hellen received seventy-three votes.

For the Mechanics' Bank of Baltimore, Joseph J. Speed received eighty-six votes, and John R. Magruder received sixty-eight votes.

For the Bank of Hagerstown, David G. Yost received sixty-six votes, and Andrew Kerskner received sixty-six votes.

Which was read.

Mr. Archer, moved to suspend the rules for the purpose of taking up the bill entitled, an act to provide for the division of the city of Baltimore, into twenty wards and for other purposes;

On the question being put,

"Will the House suspend the rules and take up said bill?"

It was determined in the affirmative.
