

Senate Bill No. 681—By Senator Blount:

An Act to repeal and re-enact, with amendments, Section 90 of Article 77 of the Annotated Code of Maryland (1969 Replacement Volume), title "Public Education," subtitle "Chapter 6. The Public Schools," to provide that the Board of School Commissioners of Baltimore City offer instruction in the safe operation of motor vehicles to certain high school students under certain conditions and correcting language therein.

The President put the question: Shall the bill pass notwithstanding the objections of the Executive?

Senate Bill No. 774—By Senators Nock and Bauman:

An Act to repeal and re-enact, with amendments, Section 9A(h) of Article 81 of the Annotated Code of Maryland ([1969 Replacement Volume and] 1972 Supplement), title "Revenue and Taxes," subtitle "What Shall Be Taxed and Where," [subheading "Personal Property Exemptions," to enlarge the definition of poultry to include fertile hatching eggs.] to provide a property tax exemption for certain hatching eggs.
