The third section of the second article of the new Constitution, adopted September 6th, 1864, and ratified by the people on the 12th and 13th of October last, provides that "the Governor shall qualify in the manner herein provided, on the second Wednesday in January ensuing his election, or as soon thereafter as may be practicable."
