By the Committee.

Question by the Committee. This flag the ladies had given
you, as it was going up some speeches were made, and there
was considerable cheering, was there?

Answer. Yes. By the Unionist at the time of the speak-
ing, then the others would cheer below.

Question by the Committee. Could you hear what those be-
low were saying?

Answer. Yes. Very distinctly, it was for Jeff Davis.

Question by the Committee. After the flag had got up to its
place was there any cheering?

Answer. Those below at Ady's only cheered once or twice
afterwards. Mr. Ensor and Mr. Ware, were the two speak-
ers on the side of the Union.

Cross-examination resumed.

Question. Mr. Ensor was there at the time, was he?

Answer. Yes. He was speaking when they cheered.

Question. Where was he speaking from?

Answer. He was standing on a stone pile up close to the
pole. He was facing the people at Ady's Hotel, where Mr.
Grason stood.
