Question. Do you know whether those persons were citizens of the vicinity, or parts of the forces of the United States.

Answer. They said they belonged to General Wyncoop's

regiment which was then lying at Cockeysville.

Question. Have you any personal knowledge of what became of them afterwards?

Answer. They were released in a few days afterwards.

The examination in chief of this witness was here concluded.

Cross-examination.

Question. How long have you lived in Towsontown?

Answer. Seven (7) years.

Question. How long have you been acquainted with Mr. Grason.

Answer. Ever since Mr. Grason came to Towsontown.
Question. How long have you held the position of Surveyor?

Answer. During the past three (3) years.

Question. You were bailiff of the court under Judge Price, were you not?

Answer. Yes.

Question. How long have you occupied that position? Answer. Nine (9) years.

Question. Are you bailiff now under Judge Grason?

Answer. Yes.

Question. You were a Union man on the 19th of April, were you not?

Answer. Yes.

Question. And always have been since that time, and are now?

Answer. Yes.

Question. As bailiff of the court, have you been thrown in contact, a good deal, with Mr. Grason?

Answer. Yes; repeatedly; sometimes almost every day,

sometimes two or three times a day.

Question. Have you ever heard him express any sentiment of disloyalty at any time?

Answer. No.

Question. Have ever heard him express any sympathy for the rebellion?

Answer. No.

Question. Did Mr. Grason run as candidate for Judge on the Democratic ticket, or was he an independent candidate? Answer. He was an independent candidate?

Question. You say you think Mr. Grason had nothing to do with taking down the Union flag upon that occasion?

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
