

tractor of sections shall appoint the times and places for working on the roads within his limits, and shall specify the kind of work, namely: whether of hands or of teams, or the kind of materials required of each; and if the said work be duly and faithfully done, or materials furnished, the lessee or contractor shall give to such person a written certificate, stating the number of days work done, the materials furnished, and the sum allowed for each. The said certificate shall be received in payment of the road tax of the person to whom it is given, within the district, to the amount of such tax, but shall be void as to any excess; and the lessee or contractor shall not give a certificate beyond the amount of such road tax, nor to any one not liable to pay such tax within the district."

Which was adopted.

On motion of Mr. Purnell,

The bill was laid on the table.

The bill entitled, An act to repeal sections 806, 807, 809, 810, 811, 815 and 821, of article 4, of the Code of Public Local Laws, and to re-enact the same with amendments thereto, relating to Baltimore and the organization of a board of police therefor;
