On motion of Mr. Schley,

It was ordered that so much of the Executive message as relates to the subject of Education, be referred to a special committee to consist of five members.

Accordingly the President announced the following gentlemen to compose said committee—Messrs. Schley, Wright, Beckett, Brown and Hambleton.

On motion of Mr. Ricaud,

It was ordered, that so much of the Executive message, and such of the documents accompanying the same, as relate to the proclamation of His Excellency, the Governor, dated the 8th day of November last, a copy of which was transmitted with the said message, and such and so much of the said document as relate to the conduct of the Recusant Electors, be referred to the standing committee on judicial proceedings.

The clerk of the House of Delegates delivered the following message,

By the House of Delegates,
January 2, 1837.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

This being the day fixed by the constitution for the election of Governor, we propose with your concurrence, to go into the election this day at twelve o'clock: Thomas W. Veazey, Esquire, of Cecil county, is put in nomination on the part of this house, and we have appointed Messrs. Hopewell and Hemsly, to join such gentlemen as may be named by your honorable body, to count the ballots and report the result.
