

Mr. Bowlus, submitted the following message, which was read, assented to, and sent to the Senate;

By the House of Delegates,
February 16th, 1837.

Gentlemen of the Senate:

This being the day fixed upon by previous arrangement, we propose with the concurrence of your honourable body to proceed at 12 o'clock, to the appointment of a proper person to be recommended to the Governor, for commission as Register of *Wills* for Carroll county. John Baumgartner is put in nomination by this house, and we have appointed Messrs. Bowlus and Harcastle, to join such gentlemen as you may appoint to count the ballots, and report the result.

Mr. Palmer, presented a petition of John R. Hamm, of the State of Delaware, praying the passage of a law authorising him to bring certain manumitted slaves into this State.

Which was read and referred to the committee on coloured population.

Mr. Kershner, presented a communication addressed to the chairman of the committee on grievances and courts of justice, by the trustees of the Methodist Episcopal church, in Clear Spring in Washington county, respecting the sale of the old church,

Which was read and referred to the consideration of the Senate.

Mr. Richardson, presented a memorial of the Executive committee of the Sundry school Union of the State of Maryland, praying to be exempted from the tax therein mentioned, and for an appropriation from the school fund in aid of that institution;

Which was read and referred to the committee on education.

Mr. Brengle, presented a petition of Henry Cassell and others, citizens of Frederick county, praying the repeal of the law, establishing the medical and surgical Faculty of Maryland, and conferring upon them exclusive privileges;

Which was read and referred to the committee already appointed on that subject.

Mr. Iglehart, presented a report of the commissioners of Primary schools in Anne Arundel county;

Which was read and referred to the committee on education.

Mr. Iglehart also, presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Anne Arundel county, praying the passage of an act
