March 1st, 1864.

We have received from your Honorable Body a message dated February 27th, 1864, announcing the concurrence of your Honorable Body in the first and second amendments proposed by this house to the Senate bill for the better protection of the people of the State against the ravages of small-pox, and refusing to concur in the other amendments proposed by this House, and requesting that this House recede therefrom.
