

Mr. Higgins presented a memorial of James Clarke and others, of Anne Arundel county, praying for redress of certain grievances therein mentioned,

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Higgins, Brown, Ely, Grason, and Carroll.

Mr. Simmons presented a petition of Charles Hodges, of Anne Arundel county, praying that certain deeds from himself and his late wife, to Rezin Estep, and from Rezin Estep to the petitioners may be carried into effect according to the intent of the parties to said deeds,

Which was read and referred to the committee on grievances and courts of justice.

Mr. Simpers presented a petition of the commissioners, and a number of citizens of Charlestown, in Cecil county, praying for an act to authorise them to sell a house and lots therein mentioned,

Which was read and referred to the committee on grievances and courts of justice.

Mr. Brown presented a petition of sundry citizens of the 3d election district in Anne Arundel county, praying an additional levy on the assessable property of said county, for the support of primary schools in said county,

Which was read and referred to the committee already appointed on that subject.

Mr. Bowie presented a petition of sundry citizens of Prince George's country, praying that John W. Smith may be placed on the pension list of said county,

Which was read and referred to the committee on pensions to indigent persons by county assessment.

Mr. Gallagher presented a memorial of Christian Keener, Columbus O'Donnell, and four thousand six hundred and sixty-six other citizens of Maryland, praying an alteration in the license laws of this State,

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Gallagher Parker, Goldsborough, White, Crane, Sprigg, and Carroll;

And Mr. Parker presented a petition of five hundred and thirty-three legal voters of Cecil county, praying an alteration in the present license law of this State,

Which was read and referred to the committee already appointed on that subject.

On motion of Mr. Shower,

Ordered, that the committee on grievances and courts of justice enquire into the expediency of empowering justices of the peace to impose fines on, and cause them to be collected from Hawkers and Pedlers selling merchandise without license.

Mr. Hillten, asked leave to bring in a bill entitled, a supplement to an act, entitled, an act to amend the law relating to distress for rent, passed at December session 1834, chapter 192;

Which was read and referred to the committee on grievances and courts of justice.
