SATURDAY, January 13, 1838.

The Senate met. Present the same Senators as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Andrew Bruce, Esquire, the Senator elect for the Western Shore, to supply the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Levi Hilleary, Esquire, appeared in the Senate Chamber and qualified by taking the several oaths required by the constitution and the laws, and by declaring his belief in the Christian religion, and took his seat.
