ther's estate, "Weston"; third son. NATIVE: third generation. RESIDED: at "Weston," near Vienna, Dorchester County. FAMILY BACKGROUND. FA-THER: John Henry (ca. 1714-1781). MOTHER: Dorothy (1725-?), daughter of John Rider (1686-1739/40) and wife Ann Hicks (ca. 1684-ca. 1733); stepdaughter of Mary Hooper Hicks Rider (?-ca. 1757). UNCLE: Robert Jenkins Henry (ca. 1712-1766). BROTHERS: Charles Rider; Francis Jenkins Henry (?-1796); Robert; and possibly also Rider (?-by 1787), but he and Charles Rider are probably the same person. SISTERS: Charlotte, who married William Winder, Jr. (?-1808); Niturah; Dolly, who married Isaac Henry (?-ca. 1802); Nancy; and Sarah. FIRST COUSIN: Ann Billings, who married Henry Steele (ca. 1718-1782). OTHER KINSHIP: his stepaunt was Ann Hicks, who married Henry Travers (?-1765); his great-grandfather was Thomas Hicks (1659-1722); and his greatstepgrandfather was Henry Hooper (ca. 1643-1720). MARRIED on March 6, 1787, Margaret (ca. 1766-1789), daughter of John Campbell (?-ca. 1766), of Dorchester County, a merchant, and wife Elizabeth Goldsborough (ca. 1735-ca. 1786); stepdaughter of both Benson Stainton (?-ca. 1781) and Richard Kinnard (?-1796); granddaughter of John Goldsborough (1711-1778); niece of Mary Goldsborough (1755-1796), who married Benedict Brice (1749-1786). Her sister was Ann (?-died young). CHILDREN, SONS: John Campbell (1787-1857), of Hambrooks, Dorchester County, who married in 1808 Mary Nevett (1789-1873), daughter of James Steele (ca. 1760-1816): Francis Jenkins (1789-?), who never married. After John Henry died in 1798, the boys' guardian, Levin H. Campbell, sent them to the College of New Jersey (later became Princeton University) to be educated. PRIVATE CAREER. EDUCATION: sent to West Nottingham Academy, Cecil County, under the tutelage of Rev. Samuel Finley, D.D.; graduated from the College of New Jersey (later became Princeton University) ca. 1769; studied law at Middle Temple, London, England, ca. 1769-ca. 1775. RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION: Anglican; his father's family was Presbyterian. SOCIAL STATUS AND ACTIVITIES: Gent., by 1776; Esq. and Hon., by 1789; member of the Robin Hood Club, London, England, which debated the issues of the separation of America and Great Britain, ca. 1769-1775. ADDITIONAL COMMENTS: The Henry estate in Dorchester County, "Weston," was burned by the British in 1780, but it was probably still in the possession of his father, John Henry (ca. 1714-1781) at that time. OCCUPATIONAL PROFILE: lawyer, practiced law in Dorchester County and was

admitted to the Caroline County Court in September 1775. PUBLIC CAREER. LEGISLATIVE SERVICE: Lower House, Dorchester County, 1777 (Elections 1: Grievances 1, 2), 1777-1778 (Grievances 3), 1778-1779 (elected, but did not attend), 1779-1780 (Grievances 1, 2: Tax Commissioners 1, 2: Elections 2), 1780 (elected to the 1780-1781 Assembly, but did not attend; resigned on December 11, 1780, following his election to the Senate): Senate, Eastern Shore, Term of 1776-1781: 1780 (elected on May 16, 1780 to fill vacancy in the 1779-1780 Assembly; did not serve), 1780-1781 (qualified on December 11, 1780), Term of 1781-1786: 1781-1782, 1782-1783, 1783, 1784, 1785, Term of 1786-1791: 1786-1787, 1787-1788, 1788, 1789 (did not serve), 1790, OTHER STATE OFFICE: governor, 1797-1798 (resigned due to ill health). LOCAL OFFICES: judge, court of appeals, appointed under the Act to Procure Troops for the American Army, Dorchester County, appointed 1778. OUT OF STATE SERVICE: delegate, Continental Congress, 1777-1779 (elected on December 22, 1777, to fill vacancy, but did not attend until January 1778; reelected in November 1778), 1780 (elected on March 31, 1780, to fill vacancy), 1784-1786 (elected on December 17, 1784, to fill vacancy, but did not attend until March 1785; reelected in November 1785); senator, U.S. Congress, 1789-1791, 1791-1793, 1793-1795, 1795-1797, 1797 (resigned on December 10, 1797 to become governor). WEALTH DURING LIFETIME. LAND AT FIRST ELECTION: no acreage found, but father had been a member of the legislature and was land wealthy. SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN LAND BETWEEN FIRST ELECTION AND DEATH: at least 694 acres in Somerset County inherited from his father, 1781; approximately 1,960 acres in Dorchester and Caroline counties through marriage, 1787; after the deaths of his elder brothers, John inherited at least 1,546 acres in Dorchester County that his father had entailed to his sons. WEALTH AT DEATH. DIED: on December 16, 1798, at "Weston," Dorchester County; retired from governorship one month earlier "due to ill health"; his body was moved to Christ Church Graveyard, Cambridge, Dorchester County, 1908. PERSONAL PROPERTY: size of estate unknown. LAND: at least 4,226 acres in Somerset, Dorchester, and Caroline counties.
