

MARVIN MANDEL a biography

MARVIN MANDEL, MARYLAND'S 56TH ELECTED GOVERNOR, began his service to the state in the House of Delegates in 1952. He served as chairman of both the House Ways and Means Committee and the Baltimore City delegation before he was elected speaker of the House in 1963. He served in that office until his General Assembly colleagues elected him by a huge margin to be governor on Jan. 7, 1969. Mandel again was overwhelmingly elected to two four-year terms, first in 1970, and again in 1974.

During his 28 years in public office, he profoundly reorganized and modernized all three branches of state government: as speaker, the Maryland legislature, and as governor, the executive branch and significant parts of the judicial branch.

As speaker, he commissioned the Eagleton Institute of Politics at Rutgers University to study and make recommendations to establish a more efficient and modern committee system and services for the legislative branch of government, which he implemented and are still largely in place today.

During his gubernatorial years, Mandel compiled one of the most outstanding records of progress, innovation and reform of any governor in the nation. His leadership and ability have been recognized by the toughest critics possible: his fellow governors.

In 1971, Mandel was selected by the nation's Democratic governors to be chairman of the Democratic Governors' Conference. During the same period, he served as chairman of the Middle Atlantic States Governors' Conference, which he was instrumental in organizing. In 1972, Mandel was chosen by the nation's governors to be chairman of the bipartisan National Governors' Conference after having served on its seven-member Executive Committee. He also has served as chairman of the Southern Governors' Conference Committee

His leadership and ability have been recognized by the toughest critics possible: his fellow governors.

of Transportation, Science and Technology and of its Energy Committee.

He was a member of the Policy Council of the Democratic National Committee and was one of five governors selected to act as liaison among the Democratic Governors' Conference, the leadership of Congress and the Democratic National Committee.

In addition, Mandel was selected by his fellow governors to serve on the three-member National Governors' Conference Permanent Subcommittee on Revenue Sharing. He also was the only Democrat among the three governors chosen to represent the National Governors' Conference on the New Coalition of Governors, Mayors and County Executives. He is a former chairman of the Council of State

Governments. Mandel also served as a member of the Executive Committee of the Democratic Governors' Conference.

Eight colleges and universities in and outside of Maryland have awarded Mandel honorary doctorate degrees for his leadership, and he was twice recipient of the coveted Herbert Lehman Ethics Award. Three times Mandel was among a half-dozen governors chosen

by the National Governors' Conference and the U.S. State Department to represent the United States on official visits to Russia and the People's Republic of China.

Mandel's first official act as governor was to restore to the Medicaid rolls 22,000 medically indigent citizens who had been removed by his predecessor. He began a systematic reorganization of the executive branch of state government, which during his first two years in office consolidated 248 agencies and departments into 12 cabinet departments headed by secretaries. Foremost among them was the Department of Transportation, which committed Maryland to the concept of a unified transportation system by funding rapid-transit systems in the Maryland suburbs around Washington and in Baltimore. Through Maryland's single transportation fund, the

only one of its kind in the nation, the state also acquired Friendship Airport and immediately began to modernize and expand the facility. Renamed the Baltimore-Washington International Airport, the airport completed the most modern cargo terminal on the East Coast.

Among the major laws the governor sponsored and saw enacted were: the strictest handgun control law in the nation; a unique insurance law that combines a limited "no fault" feature with the nation's only state insurance company; a model power plant siting law, which the National Governors' Conference has adopted as its own suggested legislation; a state drug abuse authority and a model narcotics law; a state housing agency to encourage the development of low-income housing; and a land-use law to protect Maryland's critical areas and provide for orderly development and growth across the state, and a model for modern land-use laws.

Maryland's environmental laws, among the strictest in the nation, were conceived by Mandel to protect now and for the future the quality of the state's land, air and water and the abundance of marine life that flourishes in Maryland's wetlands.


Another achievement of the Mandel administration were the reorganization and consolidation of Maryland's courts, the strengthening of the state's criminal justice system and the establishment of a procedure of selecting judges from among persons nominated by panels of lawyers and laymen. He also established a coordinated system of criminal justice information.

Mandel also acted to solve the problem of soaring medical malpractice insurance rates by creating a system of arbitrating claims over certain amounts. Arbitration panels comprise laymen, lawyers and representatives of the medical and health professions.

Unique in the continental United States is the Public School Construction Program, which Mandel conceived and sponsored to relieve the 23 counties and Baltimore of the financial burden of building schools. Under the program, the state assumed full financial obligation for the construction and major renovation of all public schools in Maryland, and full financial responsibility for outstanding bonded indebtedness for schools the counties built prior to inception of the program. Since the program began in 1971, the state has obligated more than \$1 billion for school construction, which relieved taxpayers of the costly burden of increased taxes to support the need for schools. The program has led to the reduction of local property taxes in many subdivisions and stabilization of taxes in others.

Under Mandel, Maryland also became the first state to provide operating funds for private colleges and universities. And the governor greatly increased the amount of state aid for education to the subdivisions.

Acting on the recommendations of a study commission that he appointed, Mandel sponsored and saw enacted a broad program reorganizing and restructuring the entire system of education in Maryland. He replaced the Council on Higher Education with a stronger coordinating body and signed laws granting university statues to two state colleges. The



governor also devised an equitable formula for funding special education programs throughout Maryland.

During Mandel's years in office, the state expanded its network of day care centers and the number of children receiving free school lunches. The governor created by executive order a division to deal with the special problems of the elderly and set aside a portion of state lottery proceeds for programs for the aging. While welfare grants have been

increased, there has been a steady decline in caseloads because of safeguards taken at Mandel's direction to weed out abuses and ineligibles.

By steadily and progressively expanding aid and services in virtually every area of state government while prudently managing Maryland's fiscal resources, Mandel achieved a record of financial stability. Maryland has consistently maintained the highest bond rating of any state in the nation.

Marvin Mandel was born on April 19, 1920, in Baltimore. He attended Pimlico Elementary School and Garrison Junior High School, and graduated from City College in 1937. He attended the University of Maryland and the university's law school, receiving his LL.B. in 1942.

He enlisted in the army in 1942 and served as an instructor at Aberdeen Proving Ground and at Texarkana, Texas, until he was honorably discharged in 1944.

Today, Mandel continues to practice law on a daily basis at his Annapolis law firm, Marvin Mandel, P.C. He is a member of the Anne Arundel Bar Association, National Governors Association, National Institute of Former Governors and the Speaker's Society, and is on the board of directors for First Mariner Bank and the Maryland Public Policy Institute. He is also the co-chair of Maryland **Business for Responsive Government.** In 2003, he was appointed by the governor of Maryland to serve on the Board of Regents of the University System of Maryland and has served on various system committees, including as chair of the Campus Safety and Security Workgroup. Also in 2003, Gov. Robert Ehrlich appointed Mandel as chair of the Commission on the Structure and Efficiency of State Government.

Mandel is the former president of the University of Maryland Terrapin Club and continues to remain active at the university as a member of the Terrapin Club and M Club. He is a loyal fan of its athletic teams, especially as a long-term season ticket holder for basketball and football. He is also an avid fan and supporter of the Baltimore Orioles and Baltimore Ravens.

He was married to Barbara
Oberfeld Mandel and the late
Jeanne Blackistone Dorsey Mandel.
Mandel's late parents, the former
Rebecca Cohen and Harry Mandel,
were natives of Baltimore. Mandel
has three children, Gary Steven
Mandel, Ellen Mandel Maltz and
Paul Bryant Dorsey.






