Col. Bliss: In the presence of the Representatives of the State of New York in the Congress of the Uni-ted States, I have the honor to present to you Col. Claxton, of that State, who is charged by his excel-lency the Governor with the performance of a duty which he is now ready to discharge.

Col. Claxton then addressed Col. Bliss as follows:

The Legislature of the State of New York, your native State, about a year since passed a resolution requesting the Governor to cause to have struck a gold medal, with appropriate emblems and devices, to be presented to you as indicative of the high sense and full appreciation by the people of the State of New York of your meritorious and gallant services in the latewar with Mexico. The same resolution provided that a copy of this medal be deposited at the Military Academy at West Point, and also that another copy should be placed among the archives of the State Library at Albany.

I had yesterday the honor, under instructions from his excellency the Governor, to place in the hands of Frig. General Totten, Inspector of the Military Academy, the medal intended for that institution, and I now hold the one designed for you. Upon it is emblazoned the arms of the State which so proudly hails you as her son, and whose aspiring and exulting motion of "Excelsior" you have so happily illustrated in your brilliant career. Upon it is inscribed the names of those fields which have shed so much lustre upon the American arms, and to the result and glory of which you so much contributed.—

nuch lastre upon the American arms, and to the result and glory of which you so much contributed.—But not less indelibly is the grateful recollection of your services impressed upon the hearts of your fellow-citizens of your native State, who have, by the lighest compliment which can be awarded the soldier, testified that they are held in treasured remembrance.

From the foregoing letter of the Secretary of State it will be seen that our Government has succeeded in obtaining by negotiation, from Great Britain, the all-important assurance that no Order in Council shall disturb the reciprocity between the two coun-

tries in the carrying trade; the apprehension of such an order in council having heretofore created unrasiness in commercial circles.

For the better understanding of this matter, it ought to be stated that, by the British Navigation

For the better understanding of this matter, it ought to be stated that, by the British Navigation Act, which went into operation on the 1st of January, 1850, it is provided that Her Majesty in Council may, at any time, on deciding that the reciprocity in the carrying trade between Great Britain and the United States, or any other country, is not mutual, or that British ships have not in our ports equal privileges with those which American vessels enjoy in British ports, issue her proclamation, by Order in Council, denying to our vessels the benefit of the indirect carrying trade.

The whole benefit secured to other nations by the British navigation act is thus placed, by the terms of that act, at the discretion of Her Majesty in Council. By the assurance which our Government has obtained from that of Great Britain, the matter may now be considered as at rest. The negotiation on this point, therefore, has terminated greatly to the credit of the Administration, as well as to the good of the country.

The letter of Sir Henry Bulwer on the subject of the duties upon iron, &c. was communicated to this Government, as is obvious from the face of it, in consequence of express instructions from his own Government, and quite probably in the very terms of those instructions. That letter connects the subject of the duties on iron with the modification of the British navigation laws; and, the Minister having been thus instructed to lay the subject before this Government, it became the duty of the Executive of the United States to transmit his communication to Congress, which alone has jurisdiction in the matter. The subject is sone of deep interest; and so, indeed, is the topic of the other note of Sir Henry, relating to the grant of American registers to British-built ships.

We approve of the conduct of the Executive, in submitting these propositions to Congress; it not appearing to us that either could properly have been included in a diplomatic arrangement, or treaty, between the two Governments.
