Slave formerly known by the name of Cumberland but now
called by the name of Cumberland Batson. Therefore
I do hereby positively agree and further bind myself my
Executors Administrators and assigns for ever unto the
aforesaid Cumberland Batson that them myself nor no other
person or persons shall have no claim Right or title to the
aforesaid Cumberland Batson but it is and shall be ever
my wishes and intention that he shall be for ever free and
clear from my service or any other person or persons claiming
him from me or under me in any manner whatever.
In Witness whereof for the true intent and meaning thereof
I ~~do~~ ^{have} hereunto set my hand and seal and will for ever
acknowledge the same from this thirtieth day of January
in the year eighteen hundred and one

Original wife Janny both aged between forty and forty five years and their
Delivered Son Timony seven or eight years old shall be liberated and released

mentioned to be set free liberated and emancipated according
to the true intent and meaning of the same and the Act of
Assembly in such Cases made and provided.
