CHARLES McC. MATHIAS, Jr., Republican, of Frederick, Md.; born in Frederick on July 24, 1922; educated in public schools of Frederick; Haverford College, B.A. degree 1944; Yale University (V-12); University of Maryland, LL.B. degree in 1949; captain, USNR (ret.); assistant attorney general of Maryland in 1953 and 1954; city attorney of Frederick, Md., 1954-59; elected to Maryland House of Delegates 1958; married Ann Hickling Bradford of Cambridge, Mass., November 8, 1958; two sons, Charles Bradford and Robert Fiske; elected to the 87th Congress November 8, 1960; reelected to the 88th, 89th, and 90th Congresses; elected to the U.S. Senate November 5, 1968, for the term ending January 1975; member: Judiciary, Government Operations, and District Committees; Episcopalian.

J. GLENN BEALL, Jr., Republican, of Frostburg, Md.; born in Cumberland, Md., June 1927; graduated Yale University, A.B. 1950; served U.S. Navy, 1945-46, lieutenant (jg.) (retired) USNR; one of principals of Beall, Garner & Gearc, Inc., general insurance, with offices in Cumberland and Frostburg, Md.; elected Maryland House of Delegates, 1962; reelected, 1966; minority floor leader, 1963-68; past master, Mt. Lodge No. 99 A.F. & A.M.; past potentate, Ali Ghan Temple AAONMS; member: Elks, Rotary, Moose, American Legion; Episcopalian; married Nancy Lee Smith of Cumberland, Md.; one daughter, Victoria Lee: elected to the 91st Congress November 5, 1968; elected to the U.S. Senate November 3, 1970, for the term ending January 3, 1977.

MILLS, Republican, of Easton, Md.; born in Bethlehem, Caroline County, Md., August 12, 1924; graduated from Federalsburg High School, Caroline County, June 1941; served in the U.S. Army in World War II; awarded the Bronze Star after crossing the Rhine with General Patton's 3d Army; administrative assistant to Congressman Rogers C. B. Morton, 1962–71; local manager, Chesapeake & Potomac Telephone Co., for Preston, Denton, and Bainbridge, 1946–50; commercial manager, Chesapeake & Potomac Telephone Co., for Caroline and Talbot Counties, 1950–62; Talbot County chairman, American Cancer Society: county chapter chairman, American Red Cross; member, St. Mark's Methodist Church, Easton, Md., and Easton Memorial Hospital advisory board; past president, Easton Rotary Club; exalted ruler: B.P.O.E. 1622; member of Board of Visitors, U.S. Naval Academy; married Norma Lea Nichols of Federalsburg; two children, Lynda Mills Haley and William O., Jr.; elected May 25, 1971, by special election, to the 92d Congress, to fill the vacuncy caused by the resignation of Rogers C. B. Morton; reelected to the 93d Congress.
