Maryland's first colored solons
were among state legislators
meeting at State House in Annapolis today (Tuesday) for
instruction on legislative procedure.

They were State Senators,
elect Harry A. Cole and Delia-
ne Emory H. Cole and Truly
Hatchett, all representing the
Fourth District.

But as they met the rechecks
in the Fourth District in the
close race between Harry A.
Cole and Bernard Melnicove con-
tinued in the offices of the Sup-
erintendent of Elections.

The MELNICOVE forces on
Monday morning were utilizing
a handwriting expert in their
effort to wrest the election of Mr.
Cole in the State Senate.

Mr. Melnicove lost the state
Senate election to Mr. Cole in
the Fourth District by 37
votes.

The Cole forces are complete-
ing their investigation of voter
authority cards with registration
cards in the 4th Precinct 14th
Ward.

They have come upon several
signatures which are believed to
be doubtful but whether or not
a handwriting expert will be em-
ployed by their side is not known

Nurse's skull was crushed;
find blood-stained hammer

WASHINGTON
Homicide squad detectives had
a three-alarm lookout for a guard
at the National Geographic Socie-
ty Monday as a suspect in the
slaying of a resident of the White
Saw Hotel.

A warrant has been issued for
Lester Seeger, 45, described as
the boy friend of Miss Helen
Mae Smith whose body was
found on a bedroom floor of an
apartment.

Capt. Richard Felber of the
homicide squad said that the
skull of the slain woman was
crushed by a series of blows ap-
parently inflicted by a hammer.

The homicide squad chief em-
phasized that a bloodstained ham-
mer was found in a bureau draw-
er.

CAPTAIN FELBER said that
Seeger became the prime sus-
pect after a hotel employee told
police that Seeger was seen ar-
riving at the hospital since
Nov. 3. His home is at 1629
U St., N.W.

- NAACP urges
integration
of schools
- Additions to
colored school
not enough

LEONARDTOWN, Md. — Two
hundred persons attended a two-
hour meeting here Sunday after-
noon and repudiated statements
attributed to J. Claude Johnson,
president of the St. Mary's
County School Board that colored
persons do not want integrated
schools.

The meeting was held at the
St. Anthony Benefit Society
Hall under auspices of the local
NAACP with B. L. Henderson of
Carver Heights president pres-
iding.

It was called after the AFRO
published in its November 16th
issue an exclusive interview with
Mr. Johnson, stating that the
county's integration problem had
been solved with plans for addi-
tions to existing colored schools.

Following the release of the
story—and the dissatisfaction it
produced in some quarters—in
the county, Mr. Johnson issued
another statement in which he
denied making the one attributed
to him in the Nov. 16 story.

Despite his denial, however,
the AFRO's county correspond-
ent reported that the information
stated in the first story was
based on an exclusive interview
with Mr. Johnson, held as he was
leaving an all day meeting of the
school board.

THE CORRESPONDENT said
that Mr. Johnson was saying that
the integration problem had been
solved since colored parents are
satisfied with their present
schools, and with the construction
of a new elementary school and
improvements on the high school
where would be no need for col-
ored children to attend.
