## Fourth child born to city's first family — it's a boy!

Mayor happy despite veto of his choice for a name

Baltimore's first lady — District Judge Katie O'Malley, wife of Mayor Martin O'Malley — gave birth to the couple's fourth child yesterday, a healthy boy named John Joseph O'Malley.

The baby was born at 12:12 p.m. and weighed 6 pounds, 8 ounces.

"Both baby and mother are

Judge O'Malley, who is 39, has said she plans to take about three months off before returning to work.

Mayor O'Malley had wanted

to name the newest child Sean, but Judge O'Malley — the judicial branch of the family — overruled her husband — the executive branch — and chose the name John.

Judge O'Malley joked with her husband this summer that he could name the child Sean only if he bought the family a new house. But Mayor O'Malley declined, saying buying a new house wouldn't be financially wise right now. The family lives

in Northeast Baltimore.
