The efforts of the CAPITAL and a few enterprising citizens to introduce the beginning of improvements in the suburbs of the city, is unquestionably endorsed by the public; and we are glad to know by some of the city officials also. One of them recently said to the writer, "Go ahead with your work, you are all right; but I doubt success." Why, does he doubt success? Because, understanding the tergiversancy of our people, he does not believe they can be induced to take an active interest in anything outside of their immediate business or profession. This is an unfortunate sentiment for a prominent official—unfortunate, because he clearly lacks faith necessary to work for that which he would like to see accomplished. The present movement to increase our boundaries and population and to open up a new country around us, as it were, is simply a business proposition, which if consummated will add materially to the strength, power, and influence of the city and immensely benefit the county.

It is clear to our mind, that if the city fathers and business men of our city join heartily in the proposed movement, it can be carried out to the mutual benefit of the city, the county and all concerned. The great argument in Congress is that we are only "a mile square town," have no need of a Federal building, nor of a better entrance to our harbor.
