## Garvey Urges Organization

Radical New Yorker Says Time Has Come For Colored Soldiers to Fight for Themselves.

At meetings held at Bethel A. M. E. Church Monday night, Hacedonia Baptist Church Tuesday night and John Wesley Church Wednesday night, Hon. Marcus Garvey, of the Universal Independent Improvement Association, struck telling blows in an attack upon the white man's treatment of the Negro all over the world.

"We Negroes have fought and died enough for white people, the time has come to fight and die for ourselves. From 1911 to 1918 two million Negroes fought in Europe for a thing foreign to themselves—Democracy. Now they must fight for themselves. The time for cowardice is past. The old-time Negro has gone—buried with 'Uncle Tom'."

"All white people are cowards anyhow, and the greatest coward of them all is the American white man. America is the only nation outside of the tropics where superior numbers take advantage of the inferior numbers by lynching and burning them."

## Doctors Answer Mayor Preston

City Responsible for Poor Health Conditions Among Colored People. Need of Hospitals and Sanitariums Urgent

The recent assertion of Mayor Preston that the apparent high death rate is due to the presence of a large colored population aroused interest among colored physicians of the city. The mayor was replying to criticisms made on the Health Department by Geo. W. Williams, his opponent in the coming Democratic primaries. Mayor Preston declared that the death rate among Baltimore's population was twice that of the whites. A number of physicians when interviewed asserted that such a death rate is true, but due to the city and State taking relatively little interest in the health of the colored people. Lack of proper places for the care of consumptives, being forced to live in unsanitary alley homes, the lack of visiting nurses and the very limited space provided for the colored sick by local hospitals were some of the reasons given.

Dr. Harry S. McGill, whose speech at a health conference here several years ago arousing health conditions among colored people caused general comment, says that the city is responsible for the high death rate among colored people.
