Uppair Majanisono', Mp., Nov. 28.—The constables sent to arrest the Vermillons, charged with he ring started the incendiary fires on Saturday night at Mulliken's Station, Prince George's county, returned with six prisoners. They were all arrested at the point of the revolver and after being ordered to throw up their hands, if vedeputies, Messrs, Joseph Burke, C. S. Wickham, R. L. Beall, Hune Duvall and Richard Hardesty, Jr., hearing of the whereabouse of Joseph Vermillon, proceeded to the invelling of R. Tucker, near Benning's Station, B. and P. R. R., and after surrounding this house forced an entrance and immediately ordered Joseph to throw up his hands. This he refused to do, and it was only after being roughly handled by the men that he hylbritted to arrest. He is an escaped prishipe from the House of Correction, and Mr. Moore, the; superintendent, is anxious to have him back to spond his remaining dighteen months' rentence in that institution.
