OTHER NEGRO HELD AS WITNESS
But Denies That He Saw Amy Part
Of Lynching Expedition.
Although he was but three cells away

from the one occupied by King Johnson, who was dynched, Hubert Chase, colored, the only other prisoner at the Brooklya station house, stated yesterday that he knew absolutely nothing of the lynching until told by the policemen yesterday morning.

Chase says he was awakened late in the night by the noise made by some men in the station house, but that, after listening

in vain to catch the drift of their conversa-

tion, he went to sleep.

The nigro said there was nothing to axcite his suspicions in the noise made by the men; that there was no outery from Johnson, nor was there any axcited talk by the men. Chase said he thought that these mes were policemen belonging to the station. He declares he heard a sound of acraping feet near Johnson's call, but that he paid little attention to this, he livying that it was the policemen wrestley with each other or indulging in other prants. Chase was arrested as a wit-

ness to the shooting of Schwab and taken to the Brooklyn Surtion Bonse Junday morning. He occupied a cell several yards from that in which Johnson was placed. Yesterday Chase was removed to Annapolis to the hold as a witness of the lyriching. Patrolman William L. Hawkins, who took Chase to Annapolis, said he himself was off duty at the time of the lynching, and knew nothing of it until he was informed at the station that Johnson has been killed. He said the deed had been done on quietly that persons living within a stone's throw of the sation knew nothing of it until lates.
