to Baltimore, and in his 21st year became master of the same vessel on which he shipped 8 years before as cabin boy. In 1867 he entered the arena of politics and was elected to the office of Constable, and in 1870 and '72 respectively was appointed to the office of Justice of the Peace in and for St. Mary's county. In the latter part of the year 1872, resigned his office. In 1876 was appointed to the office of Clerk to the Board of County Commissioners, of his county. Also in the same year appointed by the Maryland Centennial Committee, to serve on a committee to represent the 5th Congressional District, in the Internation Exhibition at Philadelphia. He is a student at law under J. Parran Crane. At-

is a student at law under J. Parran Crane, Attorney and Counselor at Law at Leonardtown, Maryland. In 1879 was elected to a seat in the House of Delegales by a majority of 85. He has been a Republican since that party has been a distinctive organization, but entertains the highest respect for his political opponents.
