In the late Hurricane, hardly a House was left standing on White Point; the Batteries near Mr. Martimore's, Mr. Rattray's Garden (in which was a Magazine of Gun Powder), and upon Conselliere's Creek, were entirely beat down, and carried away; the greatest Part of Broughten's Battery was beat to Pieces; and the new Works on the Land Side of this Town, received considerable Damage.

The Ship Telemachus, of Liverpool, Capt. Feartlough, that lay at Mr. Child's Bluff; 20 Miles up Ashley River, broke all her Holds, and was drove upon the Marsh opposite the said Bluff; and the Ship Eagle Galley, Capt Timothy M Daniel (which lay at the same Place), was drove almost as high as Dorchesser, into Col. Izard's Creek. The Owners

On Saturday list we had here another terrible Hurricane, which began, with Wind and Rain, about 4 o'Clock in the Afternoon, but ceased from after 7 in the Evening. ceafed foon after 7 in the Evening. In this Town, it did little or other Damage, than to the Goods of those People who removed from the most exposed Places, and the Tops of some Houses; But at Winyaw, we are informed, it was more severely felt than the former.
