(Continuation of the ASSEMBLY AFFAIRS,  
began in our last but two.)

Tuesday, October 23, 1753.

N reading the Petition of William and  
Rebecca Walli, a Committee was ap-  
pointed to enquire into the Facts.

The Petition of Thomas Barkley, a  
Prisoner in Kent County, was read, and  
leave given according to Prayer.

Capt. Henry Travers, and Mr. Joseph Cox Gray,  
returned for Dorchester County, appeared, were  
qualified, and took their Seats.

The House Resolved, to take no new Business in  
Hand, after the 31st Instant.

The Committee of Accounts were ordered to re-  
ceive no Claims against the Public, after the 29th Inst.

A Report was brought in relating to the Fees for  
some Years past in the Chancery, Commissary's,  
Provincial, and Land-Offices.

Three Petitions were brought down from the  
Upper House, referred to the Consideration of the  
Lower House.

The Affize Bill, was brought down from the  
Upper House with some proposed Amendments.

Two Petitions were brought down from the  
Upper House, referred to the Consideration of the  
Lower House.

On the second reading of the Bill, To pre-  
vent Masters of Vessels from clandestinely carrying  
away Servants, &c. the Question was put whether  
it should pass, or not. Resolved in the Affirmative.

Yeas 30. Nays 9.

Post Meridien. The Bill, For repairing the  
Public Roads, was read the second Time, and passed.

On reading the Amendments proposed by the  
Upper House, to the Affize Bill, the Question was  
put, whether the Amendments proposed should be  
inserted, or not. Resolved in the Affirmative.

Yeas 31. Nays 13.

On reading the Affize Bill, with the Amend-  
ments, the Question was put, whether it should  
pass, or not. Resolved in the Affirmative. Yeas  
30. Nays 15.

Then it was ordered to be ingrossed.

Mr. John Pace, returned for Baltimore County,  
appeared in the House, was qualified, and took  
his Seat.

Mr. Catterall's Petition ordered to be taken in  
to Consideration. on Friday next.

Then the House adjourn'd.

Wednesday, October 24.

The Bill, To prevent secreting Flats, &c.  
was read the second Time, and passed, and sent up.

The three following Bills were brought from the  
Upper House, with Amendments proposed to each  
of them, viz. To oblige Garnishees to discover  
Goods, &c. Writs of Replevin out of County  
Courts; And, To relieve the Inhabitants from  
some Aggrievances in Suits at Law.

On reading and considering the Report from the  
Committee of Grievances relating to the late Re-  
ceiver of Dorchester County, the Question was put,  
whether Disfranchisement can be legally made for any Sum  
of Money, claimed as Arrears of Rent due before the  
issuing the Patent, at any Time after the Date of the  
said Patent, or not? Resolved in the Negative.

The House Resolved, That he had illegally and  
oppressively disfranchised for Quit-Rents, &c. And  
on putting the Question, whether his Excellency  
should be addressed to order a Prosecution against  
him, or not, it was carried in the Affirmative.

Yeas 27. Nays 24.

The Bill, For Advancement of Justice, was  
brought from the Upper House, with some propo-  
sed Amendment; with which the House afterwards  
agreed.

Leave was given, to bring in a Bill, To re-  
gulate Judicial Proceedings.

Post-Meridien. Major George Biall's Petition  
was read, and a Hearing, at the Bar of the House,  
ordered on the first of November.

A Bill, To disable any Person not being a  
Freeholder, to vote at Elections, was read the first

Time, and ordered to lie on the Table. [The  
second reading of this Bill was afterwards put off  
to a very distant Day.]

The House adjourn'd.

Thursday, October 25.

The Bills, For Advancement of Justice;—  
And, Relieving the Inhabitants from some Aggrie-  
vances; were ordered to be ingrossed.

On a second reading of the Supplementary Bill,  
To prevent the injuring Harbours, the Question  
was put, whether it should pass, or not. Carried  
in the Affirmative. Yeas 33. Nays 17.

On reading an Account of Charges for Fees on  
a Prosecution at an Especial Court, the Question  
was put, whether the Charges arising by Special  
Courts should be paid by the Public, or the respective  
Counties; it was carried that they should be paid  
by the Public. Yeas 26. Nays 24.

The Bill, To prevent secreting Boats, &c.  
was brought from the Upper House, with some  
proposed Amendments, with which the House  
agreed, and ordered for ingrossing.

The Question was put, whether the Charges  
arising in the several Counties by the Inspection  
Law, shall be defrayed by the Public, or the  
Counties where they arise: It was carried, that  
they should be paid by the Counties in which they  
arise. Yeas 38. Nays 14.

Post Meridien. Sundry Petitions were read, and  
leave given to bring in Bills accordingly.

The Bill, To prevent the clandestine carrying  
away of Servants, was brought down, with some  
proposed Amendments, with which the House a-  
greed.

A Bill, relating to St. Michael's Parish in Talbot  
County, was read the first Time, and ordered to  
lie on the Table.

The House adjourn'd.

Friday, October 26.

The Bill, last mentioned, was read the second  
Time, passed, and sent up.

Leave given, for a Bill, To ascertain the  
Manner of Payment of Fees accruing on special Com-  
missions.

The Bill, To disable Persons sent in for being  
concerned in Rebellion against his Majesty, from Vo-  
ting at Elections, was read a second Time, passed,  
and sent up.

Post Meridien. A Bill, relating to St. Paul's  
Parish in Baltimore County, was read a first Time.

The House proceeded to a Hearing of Mr. Cat-  
terall's Petition, by his Council, at the Bar of the  
House, and further put off the Consideration of it,  
till the Morrow.

Then the House adjourn'd.

Saturday, October 27.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the House  
proceeded to the further Consideration of Mr.  
Catterall's Petition, and on the Question being  
put, whether the Petition should be granted, or  
not, it was carried in the Affirmative. Yeas 24.  
Nays 17.

A Bill was ordered to be brought in according  
to Prayer.

The Bill, For regulating Judicial Proceedings;  
—And, Granting Fees to County Magistrates,  
were read the first Time.

An Address to the Governor was brought in  
and read.

The House adjourn'd till Monday.

MADRID, July 26.

BY Letters from Barcelona there is Advice of  
an Engagement which happened lately near  
the Island of Sicily, between four Maltese Gallies  
and four Algerine Chebeques. The former de-  
fended themselves with the greatest Bravery, but  
were at length near being overpowered by the su-  
perior Strength of their Enemies Ships, when they  
were fortunately joined by the St. Vincent, one of  
their Men of War. The Arrival of this Ship de-  
cided the Contest, after an obstinate Fight, in Fa-  
vour of the Maltese, who sunk two of the Che-  
beques, and took one; the fourth, with Difficulty,  
made its Escape. The Maltese lost twenty Knights  
in the Engagement, and three hundred private  
Men. Yesterday Advice came, by an Express  
from Cadiz, that five Register Ships were arrived  
in that Bay, one of which is said to be immensely  
rich.

LONDON.

July 4. On the 2d died, the Rev. Mr. John  
Peter Stehelin, F. R. S. Minister of the French  
Church near Leicester fields: He was remarkable  
for having made himself Master of the following  
Languages, viz. Hebrew, Greek, Latin, English,  
French, German, Italian, Danish, Dutch, Cop-  
tick, Armenian, Syriack, Arabick, Chaldean,  
Gothick, old Tudeco or Druid, Anglo-Saxon;  
besides Spanish, Portuguese, and Welch.

July 19. Thursday a great Number of Persons  
of Distinction, among whom were the Speaker of  
the House of Commons, and several Admirals, at-  
tended a considerable Time at the Admiralty, to  
see some Experiments tried for finding out the  
Longitude.

July 24. On Thursday last a Clergyman going  
from a Gentleman's House near St. James's to  
Covent Garden, in on of the narrow Streets he  
saw laying on a Bulk the Body of a Man cover'd  
with a white Cloth, with a Plate of Salt set on his  
Belly; by him stood a poor Woman in Tears,  
who begg'd his Charity towards the Burial of the  
Dead, saying, that some brutish People had given  
her Husband so much Gin to drink that it had  
kill'd him. The Parson, willing to know the  
Truth, took hold of one of his Hands, and lifting  
his Arm up it fell as dead, which he repeated se-  
veral Times: He then said to the Woman, that  
his Hand was yet warm, and taking a Pin from  
the Inside of the Flap of his Coat he ran it directly  
under his Thumb Nail, which so quicken'd his  
Spirits, that he instantly jump'd up, made a Spring  
over the Parson's Head, and made clear off.  
This Fellow it seems is a merry drunken Cocker  
in that Neighbourhood, who is accustomed to play  
Tricks of this Nature, but had never fallen into  
the Hands of a Person who knew the Difference  
between the Quick and the Dead.

By a Letter from Fort Augustus, we are cer-  
tainly informed, that on the Morning of the 18th  
past, Archibald M'Donald, of Barrisdale, one of  
the Persons attainted for being concerned in the  
late Rebellion, was apprehended in a Wood on  
the Side of Loch horn, in Moydart, by a Party of  
General Howard's Regiment, which had been de-  
tached from Bernera Port for that Purpose. There  
were also taken in Company with him—M'Do-  
nald; Younger, of Morar, Ronald M'Donald,  
commonly known by the Name of Captain of  
Barrisdale's Guard, with four others of his Gang.  
As they were all in Arms, and had secured them-  
selves in a Hut in the Wood, they would no doubt  
have made Resistance, had they not been quite  
surrounded by the Party in the Morning, before  
they suspected any Danger. They were all  
brought Prisoners to Fort Augustus on Saturday  
the 21st, and closely confined; and on the 28th,  
a Macer was dispatched from Edinburgh, to bring  
them to that Castle.
