P A R I S, March 4.

ACCORDING to the Accounts brought from Pondicherry by the Lys, lately arrived at Port l'Orient, the English at Madras were reduced to a sad Condition, by Sickness among their Troops and Sailors: The Marrattes, who laid Angria's Defeat very much to Heart, have wreaked their Revenge upon Bombay, and carried off a great Booty from that Settlement; and the Affairs of the English would be in a worse Situation, had they not in their Interest one of the principal Nabobs of the Country, who is very hearty in their Cause, and capable of holding the French Forces in play.

Extra of a Letter from Corunna, Jan. 1.
"This Day Orders came from the Spanish Court for the Release of a Ship called the N. S. del Carmen, Capt. Joseph del Torre, a Spanish Ship, bound from London to Seville, laden with Bale Goods, which was taken by a French Privateer, and carried into a small Port near Cape Finisterre, and this Day a Declaration from the King of Spain was made public in the Streets, signifying, that all Goods (Ammunition and Provisions excepted) on board of Ships under Spanish Colours, were to go unmolested, the Property of whomsoever."

The Master of an English Ship, lately released from Bayonne for three Months, in order to be exchanged, declares that the English Prisoners are used there more like Pirates than Prisoners of War; he further says, that there are fitting out at said Port, and at Sea, 40 Sail of Privateers, of 14, 16, 24, and 36 Guns each, all which will be ready to put to Sea in May next.

March 12. Yesterday an Account came, that a small Privateer of Guernsey having chased a large French Merchant Man into Bourdeaux Harbour, went in after her, and notwithstanding the latter had cast Anchor, engaged her closely Half an Hour, and then boarded the French Ship, the Crew of which took to their Boats, and the Privateer's Men set Fire to their own Ship, and cut the Cables of the Prize, and have brought her into Portsmouth.

The Ship cut out of Bourdeaux River by a Guernsey Privateer of 16 Guns, we hear, is the Jeune Louise, richly laden from Domingo.

By a Gentleman arrived in Town from Dover we are informed that 600 French Prisoners have been sent on board the Cornwall Man of War at Chatham, and that Dover and the Castle were so full of Prisoners that they knew not where to place them.

By an Express this Morning from Bristol there is an Account that a Ship laden with Tobacco from Virginia is lost.

We hear that a Squadron is sailed from Brest; but what Force it consists of, or where bound to, we know not yet; however, it is probable we may soon hear of an Action in the Bay of Biscay, which may, possibly, throw some Light on this much debated Question since the Fight off Mahon, Whether we have a moral Certainty of Victory, when we engage the French on our own Element upon equal Terms?

It is assured proper Measures have been taken to have powerful Squadrons out early this Spring; also for sending sufficient Reinforcements to different Stations, and to augment and repair the Navy.

We learn from Cologne, that the French Train is to be composed of 100 Pieces of Cannon, 24 Pounders; 60 large Mortars, and Ten Hundred Thousand Weight of Powder; all which have been already brought out of the Magazines at Strasbourg.

Some Baggage Waggoners are preparing to embark for Germany, and some Pieces of Artillery will shortly be embarked for those Parts.

This Day was shipped for America, Shoes and Leather, to the Amount of 2000 l.

Saturday Night put into Torbay, Admiral Coates and Commodore Stevens, with the Trade under their Convoy.

March 15. On Sunday Morning about nine o'Clock died, in the 66th Year of his Age, at his Grace's Palace at Croyden, the Most Reverend Doctor Thomas Herring, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, Primate and Metropolitan of all England, President of the Corporation of the Sons of the Clergy, a Governor of the Charterhouse, and one of the Lords of his Majesty's Most Hon. Privy Council.

His Grace was first elected Bishop of Bangor in 1737, on the Decease of Dr. Cecil; and in 1743 was translated to the See of York, in the room of Dr. Blackburn; and in 1747 was advanced to Canterbury, upon the Death of Dr. Potter.

It is imagined, the Most Reverend Dr. Matthew Hutton, Archbishop of York, who succeeded Dr. Herring in the Bishopricks of Bangor and York, will also succeed him in the Archbishoprick of Canterbury.

We likewise hear that the Bishop of Salisbury will be translated to the Archbishoprick of York; and the Bishop of Peterborough to the See of Salisbury.

Our last Letters from Stockholm acquaint us, that there died lately at Sandfio, not far from Eckefid, one Mr. Lawrence Swenson, at the Age of one hundred and ten Years and five Months. He married a third Wife when he was 99, and had by her two Children at a Birth. Instances of this Kind are not very rare in Sweden, where a pure Air, much Exercise, great Temperance, and a regular Course of Life, defend People alike from acute and chronical Distempers.

By private Letters from Dresden, we learn, that the Young Count Sintzendorff Gavernits, Captain of the Saxon Life Guards, who came lately from Warsaw, by the Way of Vienna and Prague, was upon his Arrival arrested. As to the beating up of our Quarters at Hirschfeld, we have some Particulars that are pretty singular; Major Van Goetz and other Officers of Prince Henry's Regiment were invited to a Supper the Night before, where they sat up pretty late, and the Person who invited him is arrested, as being suspected of having

done it by Collusion with the Austrians, who, after all, have no great Occasion to boast, since they left fifty dead upon the Place, and filled seventy Waggoners with dying and wounded Persons, among whom was a Prince of Lichtenstein and a Prince of Wirtemberg. This City is to be forfeited, and his Prussian Majesty will have an Army of Observation in the Neighbourhood.

March 3. Yesterday a Message was sent by the House of Commons to the Lords of the Admiralty, with a Bill, desiring their Concurrence, that the Members of the Court-Martial that sat upon Admiral Byng, might be released from their Oath of Secrecy.

The said Court-Martial were ordered to attend the House of Lords, and were examined separately: The following Questions were ask'd:

1st. Whether you know any Matter that pass'd previous to the Sentence pronounc'd upon Admiral Byng, which may shew that Sentence to be unjust?

2d. Whether you know any Matter that pass'd, previous to the said Sentence, which may shew that Sentence to have been given through any undue Practice or Motive?

3d. Whether you are desirous that the Bill under Consideration of the House, for dispensing with the Oath of Secrecy, should pass into a Law?

4th. Whether you are of Opinion that you have any Particulars to reveal, relative to the Case of, and the Sentence pass'd upon Admiral Byng; which you may judge necessary for his Majesty's Information, and which you think likely to incline to Mercy?

5th. Whether you think yourself restrained, by your Oath of Secrecy, from laying before his Majesty for Mercy, those Matters for inducing his Majesty, which are mentioned or referred to, in that Letter to Lord Lyttleton?

The several Answers of the Court-Martial.

Admiral SMITH's Answer,

To the 1st, Indeed I do not. To the 2d, Indeed I do not. To the 3d, As to myself, I have no Desire of it; but if it will be a Relief to the Consciences of any of my Brethren, it will not be disagreeable to me. To the 4th, I have not indeed, further than I wrote what seemed at that Time the Sense of the whole Court, to a right honourable Member of this House, Lord Lyttleton, signifying, that if it was thought necessary, the Members would willingly attend, to set forth their Reasons that induced them to recommend him to his Majesty's Mercy. To the 5th, As the Sentence and Application for his Majesty's Mercy were the unanimous Resolution of the Court, I apprehend, I am at Liberty to give the Reasons why I requested that Mercy.

Admiral Holbourne, next answered, No, To the four first Questions.

Admiral Norris, To the 1st, I beg to be excused answering that Question, while I am under an Oath of Secrecy. To the 2d, Not I. To the 3d, Yes. To the 4th, declin'd answering.

Admiral Broderick, to all, No.

Capt. Holmes, to all, No.

Capt. Geary, to all, No.

Capt. Boyes, to all, No.

Capt. Moore, To the two 1st, No. To the 3d, I am desirous it should pass into a Law. To the 4th, Thought himself not at Liberty to answer it.

Capt. Simcoe, to all, No.

Capt. Douglass, to all, No.

Capt. Bently, to all, No.

Commodore Keppel, No, To the two 1st. To the 3d, Yes, undoubtedly. To the 4th, Not at Liberty.

Capt. Dennis, No, to all.

After which, the Bill was rejected.

It appeared on Examination of the Court-Martial in the House of Lords Yesterday, that there was but three out of the thirteen that desired the Act to pass, the other ten being satisfied that the Verdict they had given did not proceed from any Influence,
