Extrast of a Letter from Cope, Hugber, Commander of his Majesty's Frigate Tamer, to Mr. Cleveland, dated in Phymouth Sound, May 18, 1755.

"On Sunday the 30th of April, at Six o'Clock in the Morning, Portland bearing N. E. three Leagues, I saw two Sail coming round the Bill, and from their Appearance supposed them to be two French Privateers; I tacked and made Sail after them, and in a very short Time brought one of them to, which proved to be Le Chasser Privateer from Dunkirk, of 6 Carriage Guns, four of which they had thrown overboard, and 41 Hands In all. I shifted the Prisoners as sast as possible, and then gave Chace to the other Sail, and at seven o'Clock in the Evening brought her to, and found her to be Le Conquerant Privateers from Cherburg, mounting 6 Carriage and 10 Swivel Guns, with 29 Hands and the Arm Kasilo Sidded the Bristoners it blaying these mounting 6 Carriage and 10 Swivel Guns, with 29 Hands in all. Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman at Leicefer, July 10, 1759.

"This Day there happened a very awful Providence in this Town, by a Whirlwind; the first Discovery was a black Cloud in the S.
