CONSTANTINOPLE, April 17.

M. DE RIXEN Envoy extraordinary from
the King of Prussia, has received some
fresh Presents sent by the King his Mas-
ter to the Sultan; and which are still
more magnificent than those which his
Majesty sent to his Sublime Highness
the 9th of last Month. They consist of 4 Looking-Glasses,
with Frames of Silver chased; twelve Silver Chandeliers; a
large Gold Ewer, and two other Vases of the same Metal;
a Tea and Coffee Equipage, both of Gold; a Sabre, the Hilt
of which is covered with Diamonds; a Scarf, the Clasp of
which is a large Diamond; six Gold Watches with chased
Cases, set with precious Stones; a Telescope, the Tube of
which is Gold; a Plume of Heron's Feathers, adorned with
Brilliant; and two Table Clocks, the Cases of which are of
Venice Glass, and set in Gold, &c. &c.

Lisbon, April 6. All the Regiments which composed the
Garrisons of the maritime Cities, are in full March to the
Province of Alentejo. Horses are being up for the Service
of the King. Every Portuguese who hath three Horses is
obliged to sell one to his Majesty. The Arrears due to the
Troops are to be paid immediately.

Dusseldorf, May 9. The Hereditary Prince of Brunswick,
being determined to raise the Contributions he had demand-
ed of the Dutchy of Berg, marched near 20 Leagues in two
Days, and thereby appeared at Elberfeld, when he was last
expected. The Corps of Conflans, and the other Troops
that were there, retreated with great Precipitation, though
not without some Loss. From Elberfeld his Serene High-
ness advanced to Solingen, and from thence, having fulfil-
led the Object he had in View, by taking Hostages for the
Payment of the Contributions, retired without any Loss.

Altena, May 11. A large Train of Artillery is preparing
at Magdebourg, destined, as we suppose, for Saxony.

Ratisbon, May 10. There is no Peace to be expected
this Year between the Courts of Vienna and Berlin. The
former hath rejected the Four Millions offered for the Cession
of the rich Dutchy of Silesia. The epidemical Distemper
which thinned the Austrian ranks in that Dutchy is consi-
derably abated.

Hambourg, May 14. A Volunteer in the Austrian Army
in Silesia writes, that Marshal Daun will probably lay Siege
either to Neiss or Glogau. The first is the most considerable
Fortress in Silesia; the other secures, in a great Measure,
the Communication between Silesia and the Marche of Bran-
denburgh.

Paris, May 14. The Artificers work with the greatest Dil-
ligence in all the Dock-Yards of the Kingdom, particularly at
Toulon, since the Arrival of the large Quantities of Timber
brought up from Italy.

Spain hath 34 Ships of the Line ready for Sea, viz. 2 of
80 Guns; 26 of 70; 2 of 64; and 4 of 60.

Lisbon, April 25. As we have never been at War since
the Peace of Utrecht, our Troops are unexperienced; and
that is what makes us uneasy. Mean while, they are conti-
nually exercised, and we have already many English Officers
of Experience. When the English Regiments arrive, they
will inspire ours with Emulation, and ours will be the more
formidable, as they fight in Defence of their native Country.
The Maranhan Company, who maintain 3 Ships of War,
and 10 Merchant Ships, have, as a Proof of their Zeal, en-
gaged to build and equip for the King's Service, a Ship of
War of 60 Guns.

Hague, May 21. Letters from Breilau of the 12th advise,
that a Prussian Officer, with 80 Hussars, surprised an Austrian
advanced Post at Oldendorf, near Wurzen, and killed 11
Austrians upon the Spot, took two Subalterns and 24 private
Men Prisoners, with 32 Horses; and, upon their return,
they fell in with another Austrian Party, and took one Offi-
cer, 12 private Men, and 13 Horses.

Letters from Paris, received this Day, are full of the Pro-
gress which the Court flatter themselves that their Forces shall
make in Germany, being much superior in Number to those
of the Allies. Orders are sent to their Generals to begin
their Operations with the utmost Vigour. The Army in
Hesse is to endeavour to get Possession of the Dutchies of Brun-
swick and Wolfenbuttle, whilst the Army on the Lower Rhine
makes the utmost Efforts to dislodge the Allies from West-
phalia.

Letters received Yesterday from Hildesheim advise, that all
the Allied Troops were marched out of their Quarters of Can-
tonment, and by their Motions indicate that they should im-
mediately open the Campaign; so that we may expect to hear
soon of Blows being interchanged.

LONDON, May 13.

Extract of a Letter from Paris, May 3.

"It should seem that the many Misfortunes
which have succeeded one another since the Com-
mencement of the War, have made an Impression,
and that our Government begins to be roused from
their Inactivity. The Ministry are not only taking
every necessary Precaution, for insuring the Suc-
cess of the Campaign in Germany; but they are
concerting with Spain Projects of the last Importance
which tend, to nothing less than Kindling a general

Combustion in England, and spreading the Flames
of War to every Corner of it. Though the late
Tumults in Ireland have vanished into smoke, not
being supported, and though there is no longer a
Capt. Thurot, Preparations are making for bring-
ing the Pretender on the Stage. Trusty Persons
are to be sent to Scotland and Ireland to animate
his Friends, and to assure them that every Thing
will be got ready by France and Spain for the Exe-
cution of their Enterprize in 6 Weeks or 2 Months."

Yesterday the Subscribers to the 2,400,000 l. to
be raised by Long Annuities of one per Cent. for

May 15. There is a severe allegorical Satire
handed about at Paris, under the Title of a Disser-
tation on the Passage of Venus over the Sun. It
contains a Multitude of shrewd Remarks on the
Conduct of the French Venus, who, the Author
says, has verified the Prediction of Monsieur de
Maurepas, that if she lived 12 or 14 Years, she
would survive every Statesman, Soldier, and Sea-
man in France, a Sarcastm for which he has paid
dear, and his Country much dearer.

May 27. All our Accounts hitherto were unani-
mous in raising the Expectations of a happy agree-
ment between the Courts of Petersburg and Co-
penhagen, in Relation to the Dutchy of Holstein,
and it was even reported that a Convention was
already signed to that Effect. But by the last
Mails we received from the most authentic Source,
the following Account of that matter, viz. That
the Differences between the Czar and the King of
Denmark had been on the very Point of being
terminated by the Intervention and good Offices of
their Britannic and Prussian Majesties; that the
Emperor of Russia had consented to let his Danish
Majesty remain for several Years to come in the
Possession of that disputed Dutchy, provided the
latter paid the Interest of its Revenues not only for
those Years, but also for the Time past, since it has
been a Part of the Danish Territories; and that
the British Court had engaged for the Payment of
these Interests, on Condition that a Body of Danish
Troops, 18,000 in Number, should enter into its
Service. So far in Effect was this Negotiation
conducted. But his Danish Majesty perceiving,
that by paying the abovementioned Interest to the
Czar, he acknowledged him, in the Face of the
World, as the lawful Sovereign and Proprietor of
that Dutchy, Rejected these Proposals after mature
Deliberation, so that we are not likely to see the
End of these Differences so soon as was expected.

In the mean Time the Court of Copenhagen
continues its Military Preparations with the greatest
Assiduity and Vigour by Sea and Land, and leaves
no Means unemployed to augment its Forces, and
render its Navy respectable.

On the other Hand, the Scene of things at
Petersburgh, which to profound Politicians does
not yet bear a fixed and determined Aspect, carries
to the plain Eyes of less deep Observers, the Ap-
pearance of a firm and stedfast Propensity to main-
tain the Cause, and support the Interests of the
Court of Berlin. It is even affirmed that the two
Monarchs are actually employed in concerting a
Plan, which will surprize the most provident and
sagacious observers of the State and Motions of the
political World.

BOSTON, August 16.

Yesterday arrived at Nantasket Road, a Brig
from St. John's, in Newfoundland, in 20 Days:
She was bound to Virginia, and has on board
about 60 Passengers, among whom are several
Masters of Vessels and others, who had refused to
take the Oath of Allegiance to the French: They
confirm the Account of the French having streng-
thened that Place, and that they were to leave a
Garrison of 600 Men during the Winter: That
Capt. Ross, the late commanding Officer there,
and the Capt. of the Gramont, were gone to Eng-

land, and that a Cartel was soon to sail for New-
York with a Number more of the Inhabitants,
who were not allowed to carry off any of their
Effects: That the French Troops are all Fine
pick'd Men, and had recruited about 200 since
they had Possession there; but that the Fleet, con-
sisting of only two Ships of the Line, a Frigate
and a Store-ship, were poorly manned: That the
Antelope Man of War of 50 Guns, and the Syren
Frigate, were at Placentia; and that the French
were in daily Expectation of an English Fleet from
the Continent: The above-mentioned Brig was
one of the Fleet from Ireland with Provisions, and
arrived at St. John's after that Place had surren-
dered, and was afterwards made a Present of to
the Gentleman who now commands her, together
with most of her Cargo, but for what Reason may
perhaps hereafter appear.

We hear that a Brig, Capt. John Stevens, jun.
Master, belonging to this Place, foundered at Sea,
the 22d of July, on her Passage Home from
Jamaica. The People were taken up by a Vessel
in Company.

NEW-PORT (Rhode-Island) August 17.

Captain Gardener arrived here on Thursday last,
in nine Days from Halifax, and informs, That
there were three Men of War, one of 64, one of
50, and one of 20 Guns, at Halifax: That an
English Man of War of 20 Guns was kept con-
stantly cruising off Newfoundland, to keep in the
French Privateers: That there were 14 or 1500
Tons of Shipping taken up at Halifax for the
Transport Service, on board of which they were
putting warlike Stores, &c. and that they were in
daily Expectation of 5 Sail of English Men of
War, who, with the Transports, it was generally
tho't, would attempt the regaining Newfoundland.

The Schooner Lively, Capt. Hunt (a Flag of
Truce) arrived here Yesterday, after a Passage of
17 Days, from Cape Francois, and has brought
55 English Prisoners, mostly Men of War's Men,
lately belonging to his Majesty's Ship Huffer, who
was cast away some Time ago on a Reef of Rocks
near Cape Francois.—Capt. Hunt informs us,
that he left at the Cape 6 Men of War of the Line,
and 8 Frigates; and that the Talk there was, that
they were to fail from thence in October next.

NEW-YORK, August 12.

Yesterday arrived here the Schooner Dolphin, Capt. Can-
da, of this Port, in 10 Days from Halifax. He was bound
to St. John's, and proceeding to the Mouth of the Harbour,
where he luckily met a Boat that informed him of its being
in the Hands of the French, on which he turned to Halifax,
and landed his Cargo.—No Ships of War were arrived
there. Several Passengers came with him, who were in St.
John's when it was taken, being, it is said, shamefully given
up, without firing a Gun, when it had Strength and Men
sufficient to have repelled all the Force the French brought
against it.

Captain Robinson, who lately arrived here from Madeira,
reports, that he was informed there, that about the Middle
of June last, a fine Plantation, on the West End of the Island,
on which was a valuable Vineyard suddenly sunk under Wa-
ter, without any apparent Cause, there having been no Earth-
quake perceptible before or at the Time. The Part on which
were the Houses was left standing.

August 16. The Mail for Falmouth was Yesterday put on
board the Duke of Cumberland Packet-Boat, Capt. Good-
ridge, and she fell down, to proceed on her Voyage.

August 23. Thursday Evening last a Sloop,
Waterman, late Master, belonging to Providence,
in Rhode-Island Government, was sent in here by
Capt. Williams, of the Letter of Marque Sloop
Orleans, of this Port. Captain Waterman failed
from Martinico the 21st of July, but in two Days
after had the Misfortune to be taken by a Spanish
Privateer Sloop, of 10 Carriage Guns, belonging
to Porto-Rico, who ordered him to St. Thomas's,
and in his Way thither had the good Fortune to
fall in with Captain Williams abovementioned,
who obliged them to steer for New-York.

When Captain Waterman was first taken, he
had a considerable Sum of Money on board, which,
the better to conceal, he threw into a Pork Barrel;
but the Spaniards in Searching found the same,
and ordered it directly on board the Privateer.
