Translation from a Swedish Author.

NGLAND without Dispute is the Queen of Isles, the Empire and Arsenal of Neptune. She is at the same Time the Peru of Europe, the Kingdom of Bacchus, the School of Epicurus, the Academy of Venus, the Country of Mars, the Abode of Minerva, the Support of Holland, the Scourge of France, the Purgatory of Partifans of Oppolition, and the Paradife of those of Liberty. The Women are handsome, but their Beauty is attended with fomething very infipid. Bravery there, is, as it were, natural to the Men, but carried to an Excess that approaches to Savageness. Wit and Judgment reign there, and perhaps more than in any other Country whatever; but they produce a certain Air of Pride, which confiderably diminithes their Merit. 'Tis there, one may fay, that Fortune distributes her Favours abundantly; but these Islanders are ignorant of the Use they ought to make of them to Strangers, as the Courtiers and their Tafte are the only Objects of their Liberality. Their Language is an odd Mixture of almost all the Tongues of Europe; but with this Advantage, that it expresses itself the best of all of them: In short, 'tis a Nation, where nothing is wanting to its Happiness, but to know how to enjoy it. Her natural Restless-ness, and extreme Jealousy for Liberty and Property, have often plunged her into Civil Wars, which have laid her within fix Inches of her Destruction.

The three Journies I made there having let me into their Manners, I venture to affert that it is the most delightful Country in the World for young Gentlemen to be amused in, provided they are Masters of the Language, and able to support the Expence:—And if the high Road to Holl be sown with Delights and Pleasures, you must necessarily pass thro' England to it.

August 2. The Title of Earl of Chatham lately conferred on the great Commoner, was first granted to John Duke of Argyle, by her late Majesty Queen Anne, in 1706, the Year before the Union. July 3. By Letters from different Counties in the West of England, we are informed, that there are the fineit Crops of Hay and Corn on the Ground ever known in the Memory of Man.

Juh 8. An Account of the Number of Men of War built at Genoa, for the Service of France, fince the last Treaty of Verfailler, has been re-ceived here, and is faid to be as follows: Four Ships of the Line, navigated to Toulon by Genoese Sailors, without Guns; Two Sixty-sour, a Frigate, and Two Bombs, brought home by Frenchmen, without Guns; Three Seventies, a Sixty, and Four Frigates at Rochfort; besides several Transports at the above, laden with Timber for the Marine Arfenals.

July 12. The last Advices from Constantinonle mention, that all the Turkish Garrisons on the Frontiers of the Black Sea, were doubling with extraordinary Diligence.

July 15. It is reported Hostages will be immedistely demanded of the Court of Spain, for the Payment of the Manilla Ranfom

/m. 17. It is faid that neither the Earl of Bute, nor the Duke of Bedford, will accept of any Post, but that they are to have the Recommendation of certain Places of Honour and Profit; but not to interfere in any Places of Power.

Yuly 22. Accounts from France affure us, that the French in general sem destrous of a Renewal of War with us, but that the Sentiments of their King are averie to Hostility.

We are credibly informed that an illustrious Personage now acts the Part that her deceased Brother did lait Summer, by becoming a Mediatrix between the King and his old Whig Ministers. That her late Visit to Stowe, was with a View to have them recalled, and to fettle the Terms of their Acceptance with Lord Temple, and, if posfible, to prevail on him to come in along with them. Doubtlets, in Negotiations of this Kind, her Sex gives her superior Advantages to any her Brother could enjoy; for Female Influence generally proves as irrefitible in Political, as in Love Affairs; Witness the universal Prevalence of it at present both at home and abroad.

at his Country Seat in the Dutchy of Brunswick.

July 29. It is faid that a Bill will be brought into Parliament the next Session, appointing Elections for Members of Parliament to be by Ballet; which, it is thought, will almost totally prevent all future Corruption on such Occasions; as it will be impossible to know on which Side an Elector Votes, and configuently render Candidates extremely cautious whom they trust with a Bribe.

Mr. Townfend, has at left, (by the Intercession of a Noble Duke, who would not be in Office without him) been prevailed on to accept the hancellorship of the Exchequer.

The Change in the Ministry here, as foon as it is settled, will be productive of many and great Alterations in the Civil Administration of Government in Ireland.

At a late Conference, a noble Lawyer, [Lord Cambden] took the Liberty of declaring his Sentiments very freely. Among other Things, he declared, that the Administration must changed, or all would foon be in Confusion. or all would foon be in Confusion. That the Advices of the secret Transactions of foreign Courts, the Contempt shewn to our Councils, and Demands by foreign Powers; the Distatisfaction shewn by almost all Ranks at Home; and the Distresses and almost desperate Situation of our Poor; all concurred to make fuch a Change absolutely necessary without Delay: And that we did not want a Coalition of Parties in the Administration, but a Coalition of Abilities.

Orders have been fent down this Week to Portsmouth, to get ready for Sea such Ships as are in the Harbour.

July 31. The respectful Manner in which the Americans appear to receive the News of the Repeal of the Stamp-Act, does them very great Honour, and effectually justifies the Measure. The Nation will receive Advantage from it; the Ministry some Credit; and gree Glory will accrue to those who in so distinguished a Manner took the Lead in accomplishing it. The Framers of that Tax, and Oppofers of its Abolition, must now become doubly Odious, both as Statesmen and Patriots, or rather in their Pretensions to either Character, which can never more be allowed them; for as it is Disgraceful to take wrong Measures, it must be infamous to aim at supporting them,

when they are discovered to be wrong.
