They then went down the Road about Ten Miles, where they met Conrad Elder, driving a Waggon, with his Family in it, going to his Settlement at Long-Canes, and robbed him of his Watch, 1401. in Money, and took his Wise's Silver Buckles out of her Shoes, vowing Vengeance against every Person that durst oppose them: Upon which, William Watson, with his Father, Brother, and Two other Men, pursued the Villains above 30 Miles, 'til they came within Half a Mile of Robert Ford's House, who is supposed to be one of the Party.
