Soon afterwards Captain Greig ar-rived with several Cargoes, shipped long after Captain Bryson's Goods, (the chief Part whereof were shipped in London, the 12th of May, Captain Bryjen's Veilel being chartered in London before that Time, to call at Briflet in her Way to Maryland.) Afterwards Captain Johnfoun arrived, Captain Nicholfon, with Mr. Mafer's Goods, and a Ship from Liverpool, each with large Cargoes, some of which were shipped so late as the 29th of August, none earlier than the latter End of July; which feveral Cargoes were differed into different Parts of the Province, and all allowed to be landed and exposed to Sale. Our Goods lay in Store all this Time. We prefume that it could never be intended there should be different Rule for different Persons.
