

fine part of Poland which lies contiguous to the hereditary dominions. In this manner, it is thought, that unfortunate country will be dismembered. Russia is to be contented with some of the northern provinces. The Emperor and our Majesty have, we hear, concluded a secret treaty with the Courts of Copenhagen and Stockholm, and the Porte; by which they are to maintain their new dominions, which the above Courts are to guarantee. Should Russia and the Poles join to expel the Prussian and Imperialist, the Turks will be let loose on the coast of the Black Sea and the southern parts of Poland, while the Danes and Swedes are to harass them on the north and north-west; which, with the forces the two united powers can bring into the field, will effectually secure their dominions from any power. This scheme is much talked of here, and if it takes place will prove a master stroke of politics. Orders are issued for the officers belonging to the garrisons in Great Britain and Ireland, to repair immediately to their respective stations.

WILLIAMSBURG, October 19.

On Friday last the 16th inst. arrived in Hampton Road, the ship General Wolfe, Capt. Hunter, with passengers from Londonderry; 30 of them were the same afternoon landed at Hampton, mere skeletons, so weak they could hardly walk or stand, and most of them without any money to pay for their support. The inhabitants charitably took care of them, and supplied them with necessaries, intending however to oblige the Captain, who was ill of the gout on board, to give security for their support, according to law. This ship it is said had been 17 weeks on the passage, near half the time at short allowance, came out with 300 passengers, of whom 80 had died at sea of mere want and the disorders arising from it, in drinking salt water, &c. part of the time the allowance was half a biscuit and half a pint of water a day.

PHILADELPHIA, November 2.

We are informed, that about the 17th ult. came ashore at Matompkin, about 100 miles to the southward of Cape Henlopen, a large sloop with a brimstone bottom, supposed to be a whaling sloop from New England. She appeared to have been some time overset, and her masts and rigging were all gone. She went to pieces on the Breakers, and sundry things drifted ashore from her, among which were sundry barrels of oil, and water-casks, all marked R. C. with small marking-irons, a number of buckets used for oil, some small articles of cloathing, sundry chests broke to pieces, and the body of a man in seaman's dress, which was taken up and buried. More particulars could not be learnt, as she went ashore on the Breakers on Drum Shoal, and the sea ran so high as to make boarding her impracticable.

Capt. Foster from Hispaniola, on the 6th instant, in lat. 27:40, long. 72:56, spoke a schooner, Capt. William Hewlings, from Boston for Providence, out 19 days, all well.

Capt. Alibone from Dominica spoke the following vessels, viz. On the 12th instant, in lat. 24, long. 66, spoke a sloop, Capt. Thomas Casey, from the island of St. Thomas for New-York, out 4 days; On the 21st, in lat. 34:44, long. 74, spoke a sloop, Capt. William Morgan, from South Carolina for Bristol, out 5 days, all well.

Capt. Loxley from London, on the 22d instant, 22 leagues from the light-house at Cape Henlopen, spoke the schooner Chatham, Capt. Fleetwood, from Maryland for this port.

By Capt. Stuart from Hispaniola we are informed, that Capt. Cason, in a brig from this port, arrived there the 25th of September, having lost his foremast and bowsprit, and his boats, cabouse, and quarter-rails; also two negroes were washed overboard and lost: that Capt. Thompson in a sloop, and Capt. Bingley in a sloop, from this port, were arrived safe at the Mole; Capt. Wood failed from the Mole for this port eight days before him, and Capt. Martin, also for this port, two days before he left it.

Capt. Hance, from Jamaica, spoke the following vessels, viz. On the 9th ult. in lat. 21:58, long. 73:49, spoke Capt. Hervey, in a sloop belonging to this port, from Lucca for Liverpool, out 15 days; On the 21st, in lat. 31:30, long. 75:30, spoke Capt. Lew Allen, in a ship from Africa for Charles-town, South Carolina. Capt. Hance informs us, that Capt. Smith, in a brig from this port, was arrived at Kington, having lost his masts; also Capt. Roger Steward, in a brig belonging to Virginia, having lost his masts, bowsprit and boats; that Capt. Davidson failed from Kington about a fortnight before him for this port.

Since our last arrived the brig Hetty, Capt. Davis, from Vigo, who, on his passage, lost his main-top-mast; and after beating off this coast three weeks, was, by the continual head winds, obliged to put into Virginia for provisions.

Likewise since our last arrived here the ship Severn, Capt. Hathorn, from Bristol, which he left the 10th of September, and informs, that the ship Betty, Capt. Hood, and the ship Fame, Capt. Lysle, both for this port, were to fail a few days after him.

ANNAPOLIS, NOVEMBER 12.

Yesterday Morning, about Eight o'Clock, Captain William Dunlop, on board a Schooner-Flat bound from Baltimore to the Eastern Shore, being seized as is supposed with a Frenzy, leaped overboard near Greenbury's Point, with his Cloaths and Boots on, and was drowned.
