NATIONAL CONVENTION.

January 17.

A fecretary read the following letter: er Fort National, 18th January, 1794. " Good news! More prizes gained from the enemies of the republic! This morning four vessels have entered our Road. In truth it fee as as if the English were determined to pay the expences of the warm for within the two last days, ten of their ships have been brought in by four frigates to the port of Cherbourg only; the same number have been carried into Morlaix: and besides this, we have a rumour that a convoy of 45 fail have either fallen or are likely to fall into our bands. This report will foon be confirmed or refuted; but at any rate it is my duty to lay it before you.

" Every thing here is in the utmost activity, and according to the report of the oldest officers, there never was such an example given of indefatigable zeal:-Courage by fea, as upon land, fecures liberty to its desenders. Let us not however flacken our efforts in consequence of our success, but let us rapidly pursue our courie to the end that prudent philosophy directs. May the patriots always remember the last year! May it always be present to their eyes, to prevent them from falling into that lethargy which was so pernicious to liberty! May they despise those Charlatans, those scoundrel retailers of phrases at so much per line, who were clamorous in the tribune to procure the tarnish of popularity, only that they might the more securely demolish the republic! May they in fine, remember that the most dangerous pretext is, that of the public welfare! Health and fraternity.

"MULAND." or P. S. I break the scal of my letter to announce to you, that the Carmagnols, la Pomone, L'Engagement and-la Babet, are at this moment come into the Road, and bring us the certain accounts that the captures amount to fifty-two vessels, all very richly laden. They fell in with this convoy, under the escort of a brig and a floop, which they funk with a fingle broadside. All the ports of the Channel are full of vessels taken from the enemy. A descent in the spring, and England will be free. Adieu."
