That the act to appoint an agent for the year one thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight, be published in the Maryland Gazette, at Annapolis, the Federal Gazette, at Baltimore, the Herald, at Easton, and in one of the George-town and Frederick-town pa-pers, once in each week for the term of eight weeks.

As ACT to appoint an agent for the year one thinfand feven bundred and ninety-eight.

BE it enacted, by the General Affembly of Maryland, That William Marbury be agent of this state, to execute the trust and power reposed in him by virtue of this act, from the first day of January, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight, until the first day of January, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine.

11. And be it enadled. That the said agent superintend

the collection of all arrearages and balances due from the several collectors of the respective counties within this state, appointed since the first day of January, seventeen hundred and eighty-three; and the faid agent is hereby authorifed and required to call upon the treafuters of the respective shores for an accurate statement of all ar earages and balances due from such collectors, and fuch accounts shall be furnished by the faid trea-

fuers accordingly:

III. And be it enalled, That the faid agent be authorified to superintend the collection of balances due to the fait on the authority to the fait on the superintend. the flate on the auditor's books, or on open account; and the faid agent thall have power to require payment of, and, if necessary, to sue for and recover the same; and the said agent, with the approbation of the governer and council, may make composition with any such debtors, and take bonds to the state, with sufficient security, and give time for payment, not exceeding two years from the first day of January, seventeen hundred

and ninety-eight.

1V. And be it enalled, That the faid agent be authorised to superintend the collection of all momes due to the state for naval duties, fines, penalties, forseitures and amerciaments, and sorfeited recognizances, and for ordinary, retailers and marriage licences, and to require payment, and, it necessary, sue for and recover the same; and the said agent may allow for intolvencies, and credit any money that the party is not chargeable with by law, and for his information of the law, he may take the advice of the attorney-general in

writing.
V. And be it enalled, That whenever there shall be occasion: to expose to public sale the property of any collector, or his fecurities, by virtue of any execution siredly issued, or to be issued for this purpose, the said agent shall cause at least thirty days public notice to be given of such sale, and shall attend the same, and if it thall appear that there is danger of loung any part of the debt due to the flate, and not otherwise, shall purchale any property to exposed to fale for the ule of the flate, in payment, or part payment; as the cale may be, of the arrearages due by the collectors whose property may be so purchased, and that no purchase authorised by this act shall be considered as made on the part of the state, unless a public declaration to that effect be made by the agent, or his deputy, immediately after furb fale and purchase; and any property so purchased for the use of the state, the said agent may again expose to public auction on the most advantageous terms, for the use of the state, and if the same be sold on credit, which shall in no case exceed the term of two years, the which shall in no case exceed the term of two years, the faid agent shall take bond, with good and sufficient security, to be approved of by the treasurer of the western shore, from the purchasers of such property, and all bonds by him so taken shall be deposited, with an accurate lift thereof subscribed by him, in the treasury of the western shore, and shall be a lien upon the real property of such purchasers, and their securities, from the respective dates, or so much thereof as is mentioned in the schedule thereof annexed.

VI. And be it profiled. That the said agent is hereby

VI. And be it enaffed, That the faid agent is hereby directed to dispose of all conficated British property that remains unfold, and take bonds to the state, with fufficient fecurity, and give time for the payment thereof, not exceeding two years from the first day of lanuary, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight, and that where the quantity of land in any one body sub-ject to such fall exceeds the quantity of fitty acres, such land shall be disposed of at public sale, of the time and place of which sale at least thirty days previous notice shall be given by public advertisement; and that at the time of any fale by virtue of this act, the fald agent shall make known that he only fells the right of this state thereto, and that the state doth not guaranty the title to the fame, or any part thereof, but that the purchase must be in all respects at the risk of the pur-

chafer.

VII. And be it enalled, That no payment in future by any officer or period indebted to the flate field bevalled and effectual, unless made to the treaturer of the trainer. western or eastern shore, or to the agent for the time being, or unless made to the clerks and sheriffs of the teveral counties, in the cases where the said clerks and theriffs are by law authorised to receive the same.

VIII. And be it enalled, That the agent frail have VIII. 128. And be it enalied, That the agent, with the approbation and confent of the governor and council, be and he is hereby authorifed and empowered to compromife any fuit depending in chancery with any flate debtor, upon any terms in their judgment calculated to

promote the interest of the state, and to obtain the speedy receipt of the sums due.

X. And be it enaled, That is, under the terms of any compromise made as aforesaid, the property heretotore purchased should be taken back and revested in the state, the same may be fold by the agent, and he is hereby authorised and empowered to sell the same at public fale, giving thirty days notice, on a cre-dit of two years, payable one half of the principal, and the wildle interest, annually, on the first day of December in each year, and the bonds, when taken, shall be returned to the treasury of the western shore,

and reported to the general affembly at their fession next entuing the taking or such bonds.

XI. And be it enalled, I hat all cases in chancery, where no compromise under this act is effected, shall be placed under the direction of the agent, who is hereby authorited and requires to call in the attorney-general to profecute or defend the tame to immediate final de-cifion; and the governor and council are hereby authorifed and empowered, at the request of the agent, in cases of difficulty, to aid the atterney-general, by employing any person to attend to surveys where necessary, or otherwise to affect in the profession or defence of faid fulls, which perion to perfous are to be paid out of the contingent fund of five hundred pounds; and the names of the perions to employed, together with the turn anowed for their fervices, to be laid before

And be it enacted, That it any bond debtor to the state for confinated property purchased, or otherwise, shall neglect to make payment agreeably to the condition of his cent, and sundry resolves of the general affermely, the said agent shall cause process to issue for the whole principal and interest then due, or shall proceed on any execution already issued, and served on any execution already issued, and served.

XIII. And be it enaced, That the said agent be authorised to superintend the collection of all balances due on bond taken for t xes due before the first day of January, seventeen hundred and eighty-three; and the said agent shall also superintend the collection of all balances due on bonds initalled, or otherwise, for the emissions of paper money of seventeen hundred and fix-

emissions of paper money of seventeen hundred and fix-ty-nine, and sevent-en hundred and seventy-three. XIV. And be it enalled, That no process shall issue against any of the public debtors, unless by the directi-on of the said agent.

XV. And be it enaded, That the faid agent shall have power to fix such days of fale of property taken by properly taken days of faire of property taken by fari facias, at the fuit of the flate, as he may think proper, always taking care to give at tealt twenty days public notice thereof; and the faid agent shall also have power to suspend the fales, from time to time, as he may think most to the advantage of the state.

XVI. And be it enalled. That the said agent shall pay into the treatury, in specie, the amount of all specie by him received in the discharge of the duties of this act.

XVII. And be it enalled, That in all cases where bonds shall be taken in virtue of this act, the bonds shall be a lien on all the real property of the obligors from the date thereof, or on so much of the said real property as the governor and council shall think sufficient property as the governor and council shall think sufficient, to be particularly mentioned in a schedule to be annexed to the said bond, in which case it shall be a hen on the property contained in such schedule, and no more, such bond and schedule to be lodged with the

treasurer of the western shore; XVIII. And be it enached, That all bonds trken in wittue of this act shall express the county in which the obligors respectively reside, and the treasurer of the western shore shall, within one month after he receives them respectively, cause them, with the schedule annexed to them, to be recorded in the office of the clerk of the general court of the western shore, at the expense of the obligors; and a copy of the said record, certified under the hand and official said of the faid clerk, shall be as good evidence in any court of law or coulty. shall be as good rwidence in any court of law or equity in this state as the original bond would be if it was produced; and if any of the obligors in any such bonds refide on the eaftern shore, the said treasurer shall, within fix months from the time he receives the same respectively, transinit to the clerk of the general court the eastern hore, in the fame manner public fervice are transmitted, a copy of fuch honds and schedules, certified as aforesaid by the clark of the general court of the weltern thore, to be recorded in

general court of the weltern shore, to be recorded in the effice of the clerk of the general court of the eaftern shore, at the expense of the obligors, and in such case a copy of the laid record, certified as a forestaid by the clerk of the general court of the eastern shore, shall be good evidence as aforestaid.

XIX. And be it randed, That the faid agent shall render to the treasurer of the weltern shore distinct quarterly accounts of his receipts of all money, certificates and honds, in virtue of this act, and shall immediately thereupon pay and deliver the same to the said treasurer, who shall, in his annual report to the general assembly, thate fully and particularly the money, certificates and flate fully and particularly the money, certificates and bonds, by him received from the faid, agent, and the times when the lame were received and accounted for.

XX. And be it enalled. That the faid agent shall render a fair and full account of his several proceedings under the authority of this act to the general assembly at their next session, and within the first ten days after its commencement, in which account shall be specified, under distinct heads, his own receipts, and those of the treasurer, and of all transfers of stock upon which he may be entitled to commission, and in which shall also be contained a particular estimate of his commissions, shewing how and upon what the same arose due.

XXI. And be it enacted. That the said agent shall be allowed for his services the following commissions, to wit: for all payments actually made to either of the treasurers in virtue of this act, three per cent, and for all bonds with security taken by the said agent in virtue of this set, three per cent, provided that the whole amount of his commission shall not exceed five hundred pounds current money, and he shall lay an account of the same, on eath, before the next session of assembly. XX. And be it enadled, That the faid agent shall ren-

XXII. And be it enacted, That hereaster it shall be the duty of the agent, and the treasurers of the western and eastern shores respectively, to receive, as well the fisteen per cent, interest, if any shall have accrued, as all other the arrearages that are now, or may hereaster become due from sines, forfeitures and americal ments, ordinary residers, parsing haplyers and the ments, ordinary, retailers, marriage, hawkers and amercia-ments, ordinary, retailers, marriage, hawkers and ped-lers licepees, and which fifteen per cent. so collected, shall be the only fund out of which the agent shall draw his commission of three per cent. for collecting the same; provided that the said agent shall not be en-titled to any commission upon the monles arising from sines, forfeitures, amerciaments, ordinary, retailers, marriage, hawkers and pedfers licences, unless in cases where the same shall not be paid by the sheriffs and clerks respectively, to the treasurer within one month clerks respectively, to the treasurer within one month after the time prescribed by law, and unless the faid

And be it enacted, That the said agent, before he enters upon the execution of the duties of this act, shall give bond to the state, before the governor and council, in the penalty of fixty thousand dollars, with such security as the governor and council shall approve, for the faithful performance of the said duties, which bond shall be lodged with the treasurer of the western shore, and shall aifo take an oath before the chancellor, that he will well and saithfully discharge the duties as agent under the act, entitled, An act to appoint an agent for the year one thousand seven hundred and agent for the year one thouland seven hundred and ninety-eight, to the best of his skill and judgment, the certificate of which oath shall be annexed to, or endorfed on, the faid boud.

XXIV. And be it enacted, That if the faid agent shall not accept his appointment, or if after his acceptance he shall not give bond, and take the oath aforesaid, before the first day of February next, or shall die, the governor and council are hereby authorised and requested to appoint a sit and proper person in his place, who shall have and execute all the authorities and powers vested in the said William Marbury by this act, such person first giving security, and taking the oath aforesaid.
